AB 2449 Provides Remote Options for Public Agencies

Despite the end of the COVID-19 pandemic, public agencies still have options available to them if they need to exercise remote participation for members of their legislative bodies. AB 2449 provides that if a quorum of the legislative body participates in person, a member of a legislative body may participate remotely so long as the member provides prompt notice and the need for remote participation falls under one of the statutorily defined exceptions. The member does not need to identify their location nor ensure it is accessible to the public.

Members of legislative bodies can use AB 2449 to participate remotely if there is “just cause” or if “emergency circumstances” exist. “Just cause” is defined as any of the following:

- Providing childcare or caregiving of a parent, grandparent, grandchild, sibling, spouse, or domestic partner that requires the member to participate remotely.
- A contagious illness that prevents attendance in person.
- Tending to a need related to a physical or mental disability.
- Travelling for business of the legislative body or another state or local agency.

“Emergency circumstances” are defined as follows:

- A physical or family medical emergency that prevents a member of a legislative body from attending in person.

Notice Must be Provided to Utilize AB 2449’s Provisions

In order to utilize the provisions of AB 2449, members of a legislative body must inform their public agency at the earliest possible opportunity of their need to participate remotely, which can include before the start of the meeting. The member must also provide a general description of the circumstances that require remote participation. In the case of emergency circumstances, the member must actually request that the legislative body allow them to participate remotely and the legislative body has to take action on this request.

Any member participating remotely because of just cause or emergency circumstances must publicly disclose at the meeting before any action is taken, whether any other individuals 18 years of age or older are present in the room at the remote location with the member, and the general nature of the member’s relationship with any such individuals.

Members and Public Must have Option to Participate in Meetings both Audibly and Visually

When a member participates remotely, he/she must utilize both audio and visual capabilities to effectuate compliance with the statute. Therefore, members of public agencies cannot use a call in only option to attend meetings, they must be on camera. Additionally, the legislative body is responsible for ensuring that the public can also participate in meetings remotely. This includes providing a way for the public to remotely hear, visually observe, and remotely address the legislative body. Furthermore, members of the public can no longer be required to submit their comments prior to the meeting but instead must be allowed to give comments in real time.

CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order by Chair Kluge at 6:30 pm.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

On a motion by Supervisor Mashburn and a second by Supervisor Vasquez the Board unanimously approved by roll call vote the agenda.

PUBLIC COMMENT

There was a public comment from George Guynn. The Water Agency has many decisions to make in the future, particularly with the state wanting to control water in Lake Berryessa. Entities like Travis Air Force Base may leave if this happens. Solano needs water to be able to thrive and make the region a better community.

CONSENT ITEMS

On a motion by Supervisor Vasquez and a second by Mayor Hernandez the Board unanimously approved by roll call vote the following consent items:

- (A) Minutes
- (B) Expenditure Approvals
- (C) Quarterly Financial Reports
- (D) Purchase of Replacement Irrigation Pipe for Peterson Ranch
- (E) Purchase Order for Automation Controllers for Union and McCoy Checks on the Putah South Canal.

BOARD MEMBER REPORTS

There were no board member updates.

GENERAL MANAGERS REPORT

General Manager Chris Lee shared with the Board that it was a slow start to the water year. However, the most recent snow surveys have been good. For Lake Berryessa, the lake has technically not spilled, but the reservoir is full. Water Agency staff have been continuing to talk about the Healthy Rivers & Landscape (HRL) Program. There is an upcoming 3-day State Water Board workshop on the HRL program, of which staff will be in attendance. On other items, Andy Florendo is retiring after 17 years

with the Water Agency of leading and working with each of the Solano agencies on the region's Water Conservation Program. Lastly, after six years of planning, design, and construction, the Water Agency anticipates moving into the new building space next month.

NORTH BAY WATERSHED ASSOCIATION REPORT

Ms. Elizabeth Patterson shared with the Board that the North Bay Watershed Association is having their annual conference. Ms. Patterson went through the conference topics, including items such as riparian and basin planning projects, grazing waiver, winery general ordinance, and storm water management.

Supervisor Williams arrived at 6:42 pm.

SOLANO WATER ADVISORY COMMISSION REPORT

Commission Chair Danielle Bonham had nothing to add. There was a public comment from James Berg in regard to water quality concerns in Suisun City. Residents in one part of town received a letter about high trihalomethane (THM) concentrations. Chair Kluge recommended that members of the public should bring these concerns to the Suisun-Solano Water Authority (SSWA) Board, as that would be the more applicable board.

PROPOSITION 1 GRANT PUTAH CREEK BYPASS FOR SALMON PASSAGE AT LOS RIOS CHECK DAM

General Manager Chris Lee provided an overview to the Board of the Los Rios Check Dam. The Los Rios Check Dam is located at the lower end of Putah Creek, within the Yolo Bypass Wildlife Refuge. The dam is owned by the California Department of Fish & Wildlife (DFW) and operated by Los Rios Farms. The Los Rios Check Dam blocks fish passage in Lower Putah Creek. Streamkeeper Max Stevenson was able to obtain a planning grant from DFW, to look at improvements to the Los Rios Check Dam for improved fish passage.

There was public comment on this item. Will salmon impact the region's water supply? If not, this would be a good project to protect salmon. However, what is the financial impact on the community from getting this project? In the summer Lake Berryessa water gets hot, yet salmon need cold water to survive. Need to have a thoughtful and balanced approach.

On a motion by Supervisor Vasquez and a second by Supervisor Mashburn the Board unanimously approved by roll call vote to approve resolution 2024-03 Accepting Proposition 1 funds for the Putah Creek Bypass for Salmon Passage at Los Rios Check Dam.

CREATION OF STREAMKEEPER CLASSIFICATION SERIES

General Manager Chris Lee provided an overview to the Board, that the goal is to create a professional series for the Streamkeeper position, consistent with other agency classifications. The intent is to be equitable across the agency, as the Streamkeeper position was not included in the prior Salary Survey that was approved by the Board. During the Workforce Study, Boucher Law did look at comparables for the Streamkeeper position, but the position was not included in the most recent Salary Survey. The purpose of this agenda item is to update the Salary Survey to include the Streamkeeper series.

On a motion by Supervisor Hannigan and a second by Supervisor Williams the Board unanimously approved the following items:

1. Creation of Streamkeeper Series to include I, II, and III positions, replacing the standalone Streamkeeper position.
2. Approve placement of the Streamkeeper I, II, and III salary recommendations matching the benchmark Streamkeeper III classification to the Agency's existing Supervising Water Resources Specialist position and adopt updated CalPERS pay schedule effective April 14, 2024.
3. Approve General Manager to place current Streamkeeper into the Streamkeeper III position.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATES

Bob Reeb provided a legislative update to the Board. For AB-2196 which was regarding the beaver restoration project, the Agency had a watch position. Mr. Reeb was able to testify in front of the legislature and talk with the assembly members about the Water Agency’s concerns. There was an agreement to include local agencies, and avoiding or mitigating beaver placement where they could harm levees or urban creeks. There was also an invitation to meet with the DFW manager leading this effort. For AB-2079, the Agency had an oppose unless amended position. The bill would require local enforcement agencies, specifically the GSAs, to adopt standards developed by DWR that would prevent ag wells being drilled if there was even a very small subsidence, in some cases less than 0.1-ft. Instead, would like to see an exemption for basins that are not in critical overdraft. Climate Resiliency Bond discussions are heating up and Governor Newsom is reengaging the legislature, with a target of \$6.5-\$8-billion for the bond. The Governor and Legislature reached agreement of a \$17-billion deficit for the upcoming Fiscal Year. The State will use the rainy-day fund and borrow to make up for the deficit.

WATER POLICY UPDATES

There were no updates from staff or from Supervisor Vasquez. Supervisor Mashburn shared with the Board that the Delta Counties Coalition (DCC) has met a few times with the Metropolitan Water District and toured each other’s facilities. While the DCC opposes the tunnels, Solano, Contra Costa, and San Joaquin Counties are filing together, Sacramento County is filing separately, on litigation with regards to the Delta Conveyance Project. On other items, the Delta Conservancy just awarded Suisun City \$800,000 for a new pier for the community.

There were several public comments. Members of the public were appreciative of the DCC’s opposition to the Delta Conveyance Project, as that could really impact Solano County. Additionally, members of the public shared their concern about the State taking our region’s water supply, and the need to push back against the State.

Water Supply Update

The State Water Project allocation was increased from 30 percent to 40 percent on April 23. For those of us North of the Delta, our allocation was increased to 65 percent.

On April 2nd, the Department of Water Resources (DWR) conducted the fourth and final snow survey of the season at Phillips Station. The manual survey recorded 64 inches of snow depth and a snow water equivalent of 27.7 inches, which is 113 percent of average for this location. The April measurement is critical as it is considered the peak snowpack for the season and marks the transition to spring snowmelt into the state's rivers and reservoirs.

California's reservoirs remain in good shape thanks to the state's effort to capture and store as much water as possible from record storms in 2023 and again this year. The State Water Project has increased storage by 700,000 acre-feet at Lake Oroville and by 154,000 at San Luis Reservoir since January 1. Statewide, reservoir levels currently stand at 116 percent of average.

For the Solano Project, the water supply outlook remains unchanged with full allocations for the 2024 Water Year. As of May 2, Lake Berryessa held 1,546,195 acre-feet in storage (99.99% of full capacity), at elevation 439.92, just below the Glory Hole. The Glory Hole starts to spill at elevation 439.95, with 1 cfs going over the rim. At elevation 440, the spill is at 10 cfs.

Bay Delta Plan Update

On April 24-26, the State Water Board held a workshop on the Healthy Rivers and Landscapes Programs (Voluntary Agreements) related to the Sacramento/Delta Water Quality Control Plan (Bay-Delta Plan) Update. At the workshop, Alex Rabidoux, Assistant General Manager, gave a presentation on Putah Creek as part of a larger panel on Sacramento River Tributaries. Over the course of the workshop, there were many public comments. We had several commentators from Solano County, including Mayor Alma Hernandez, Suisun City, Cary Keaten, General Manager of Solano Irrigation District, Michael Heather, City of Fairfield Assistant Public Works Director, and Mr. Rabidoux. We do not expect the State Water Board to make any decisions until the end of the year at the earliest, more likely this will spill in to 2025.

On May 8th, staff will be part of a panel at the ACWA Spring Conference in Sacramento. The program is titled Understanding the Bay Delta Plans' Impacts on Region 4. Staff will present impacts to Solano County and share our Putah Creek Healthy Rivers and Landscapes Program.

Background: At the March meeting, staff gave the Board an overview of an alternative approach to the unimpaired flows in the Bay Delta Plan Update. The Healthy Rivers and Landscape Program (i.e., Voluntary Agreements) is supported by the Governor and the California Natural Resources Agency. Rather than just flow increases, the Healthy Rivers and Landscape Program proposes additional flows, restoration efforts, and scientific monitoring as a more holistic approach to help declining fish species in the Bay-Delta.

LPCCC Update

Mother nature has delivered and there is plenty of water in Putah Creek this spring! With Lake Berryessa so full, extra water has been sent through the hydroelectric turbines and down to Putah Creek. These extra flows count as extra-large spring 'pulse flows' to benefit the environment and groundwater recharge. In normal years, the spring pulse flow is 50 cfs over one month. This year the pulse flows were hundreds of cfs, over more than 6 weeks. The high flows delayed the deployment of the Rotary Screw Trap (RST). UC Davis uses the RST to count baby salmon. However, now the baby salmon are showing to be larger and in better condition than previous years, perhaps because the larger spring pulse flows have benefited the salmon by allowing access to more floodplain rearing habitat.

LPCCC continues working on the Putah Creek Water Management (PCWM) project. The Water Agency is responsible for providing flows for all the needs in the Creek; fish flows, water for irrigation, and water for groundwater recharge. Coordinating these flows and sharing the Creek is the goal of PCWM. <https://www.scwa2.com/pcwm/> This summer we are increasing coordination with farmers that pump water from Putah Creek. We are all working together to share the flows.

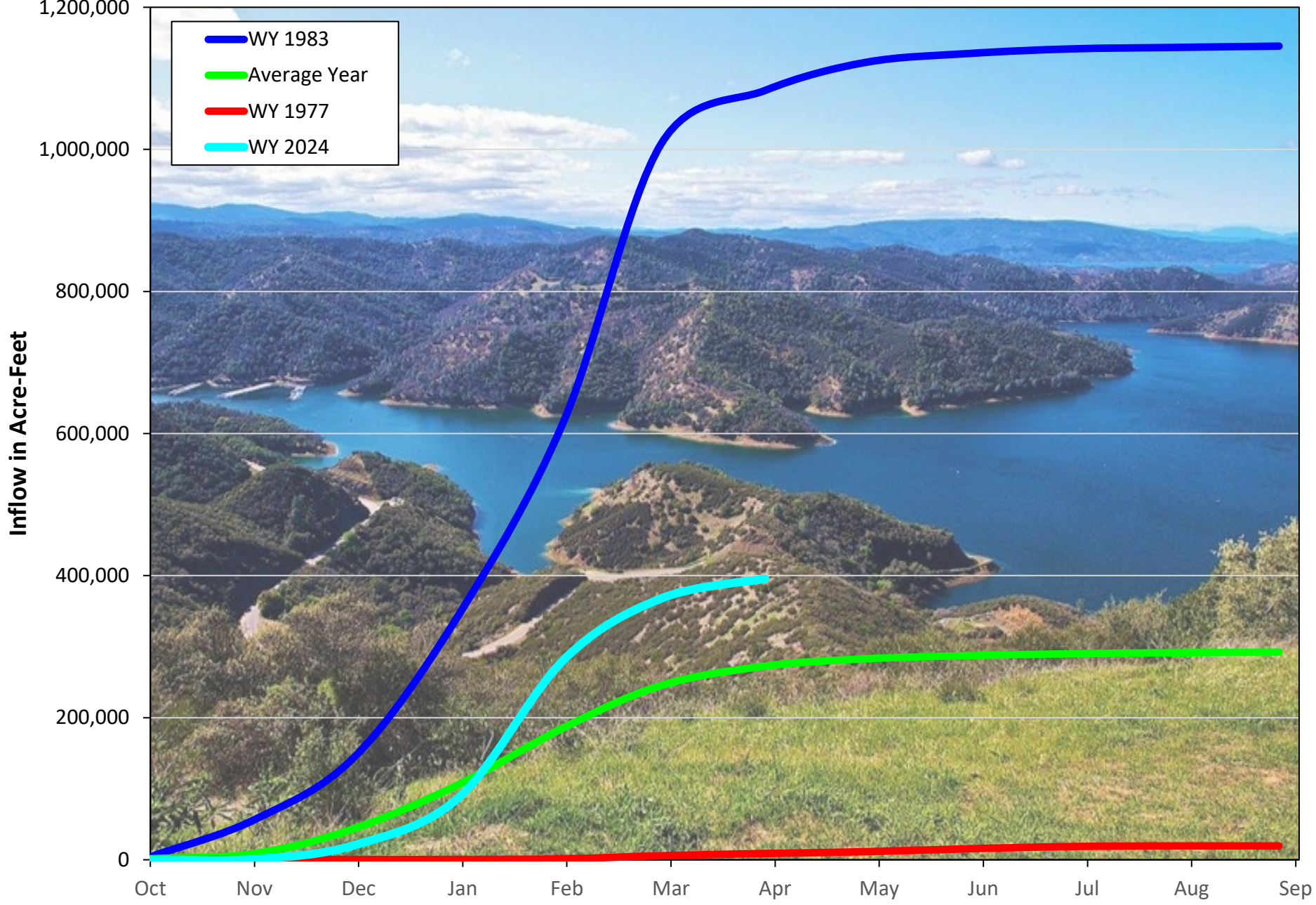
SCWA hosted a Putah Creek Monitoring Data Summit on April 19, 2024, at UC Davis. Details of the meeting are covered in a separate Board agenda item. The official number of salmon spawning in Putah Creek during the 2023 run was 735 adult fall-run Chinook salmon.

The California Department of Fish and Wildlife has awarded the Water Agency an \$825,000 grant to address fish passage issues in the Creek below I-80 near the Los Rios Check Dam. The Check Dam is in the Yolo Bypass Wildlife Area near West Sacramento. At times, the Check Dam is a barrier to adult and juvenile salmon. The grant funded project will work on solving fish passage issues at the Check Dam. Solutions could include a new bypass channel, re-operating the Check Dam at a lower level, or even fish ladders. Better connecting the spawning grounds near

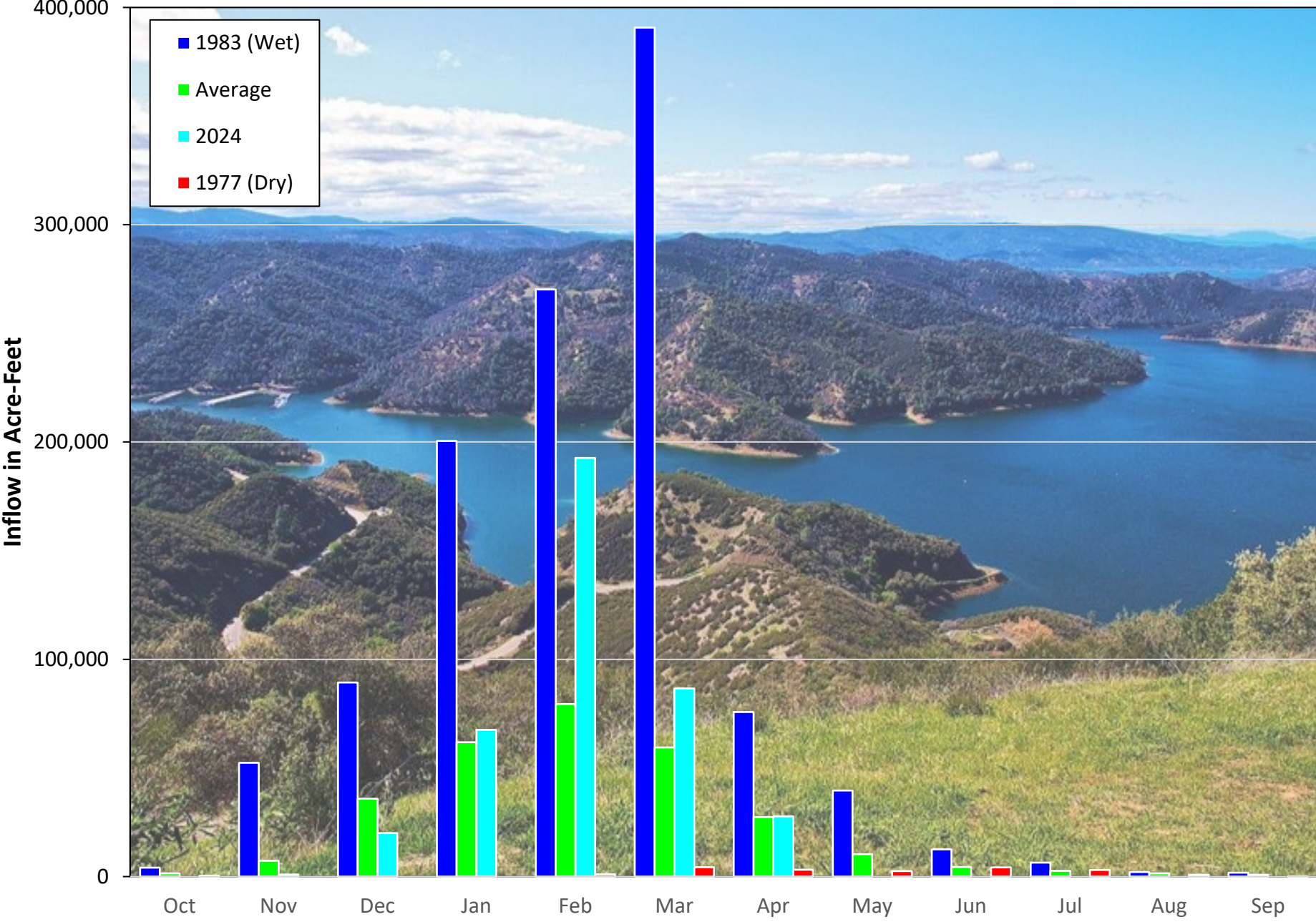
Winters all the way to the ocean is the goal. The California Dept of Fish and Wildlife and farmers along Putah Creek are our main partners for the project.

The Lower Putah Creek Coordinating Committee (LPCCC) is a public forum for all things Putah Creek. The LPCCC reports and makes recommendations to the Water Agency. LPCCC meetings are held regularly at the Water Agency offices the second Thursday of the month, starting at 3 PM.

Annual Lake Berryessa Inflow



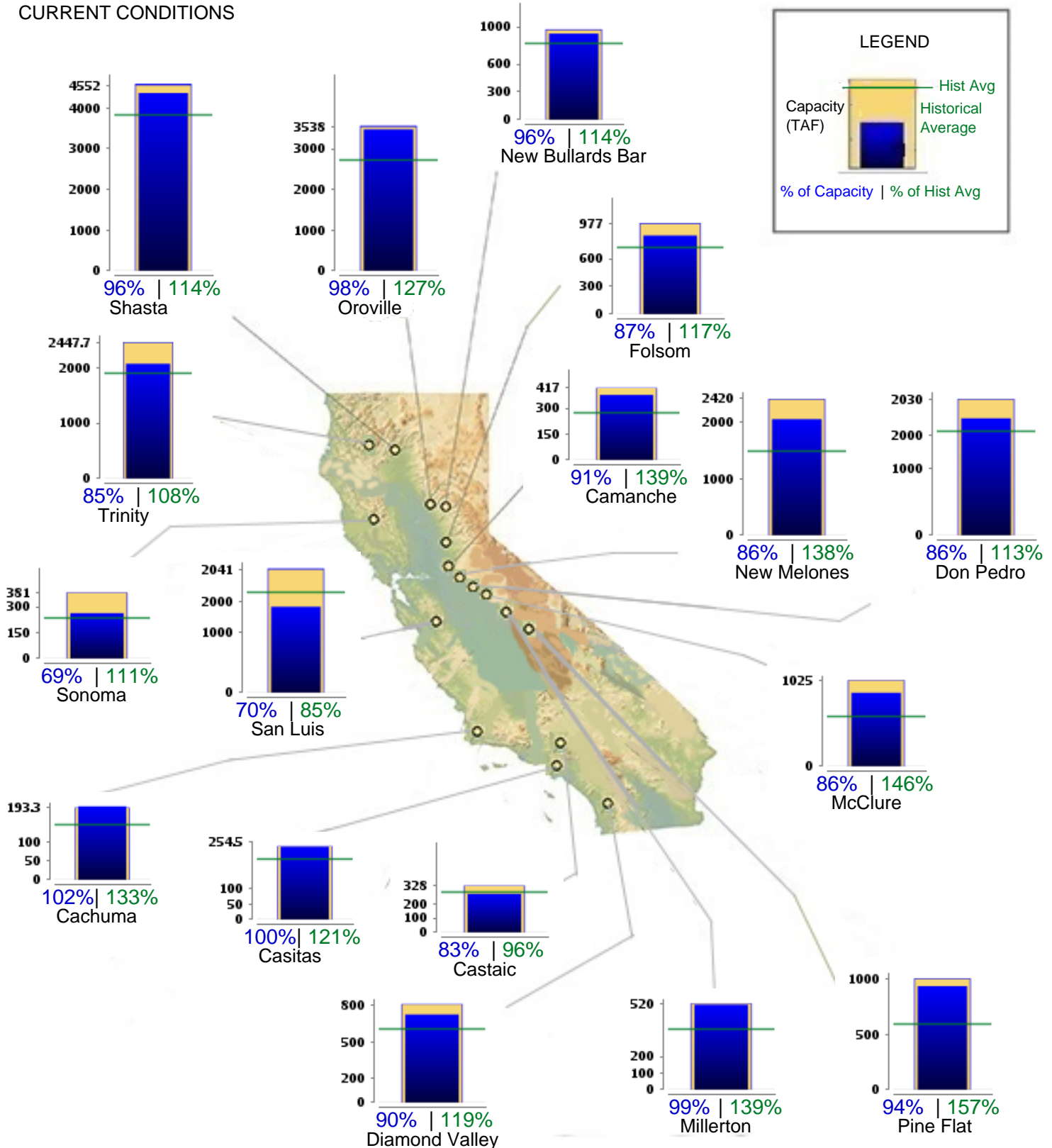
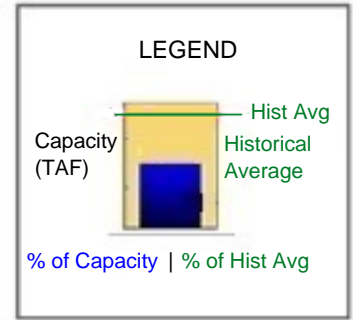


CURRENT RESERVOIR CONDITIONS

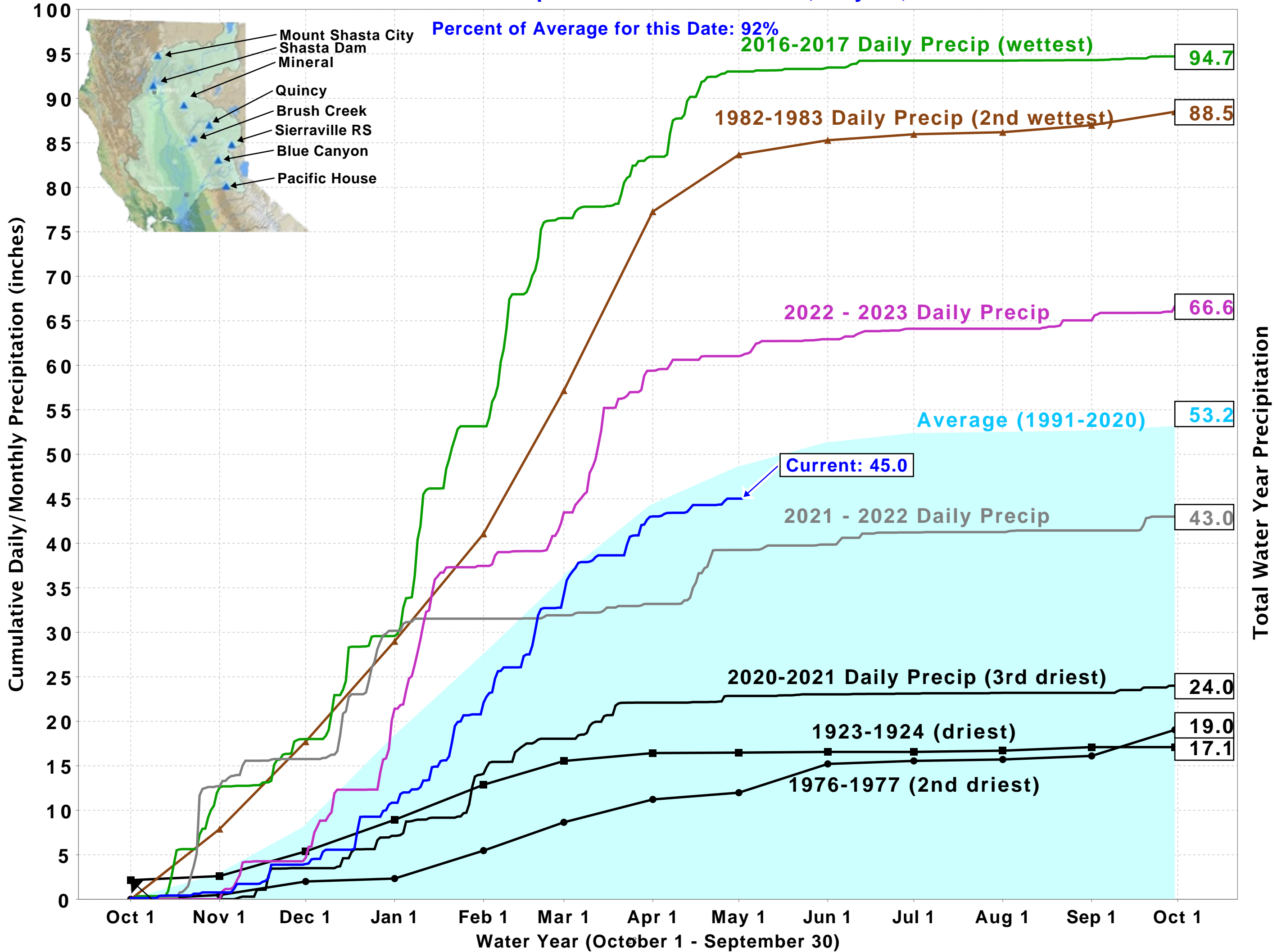
CALIFORNIA MAJOR WATER SUPPLY RESERVOIRS

Northern Sierra Precipitation: 8-Station Index, May 02, 2024

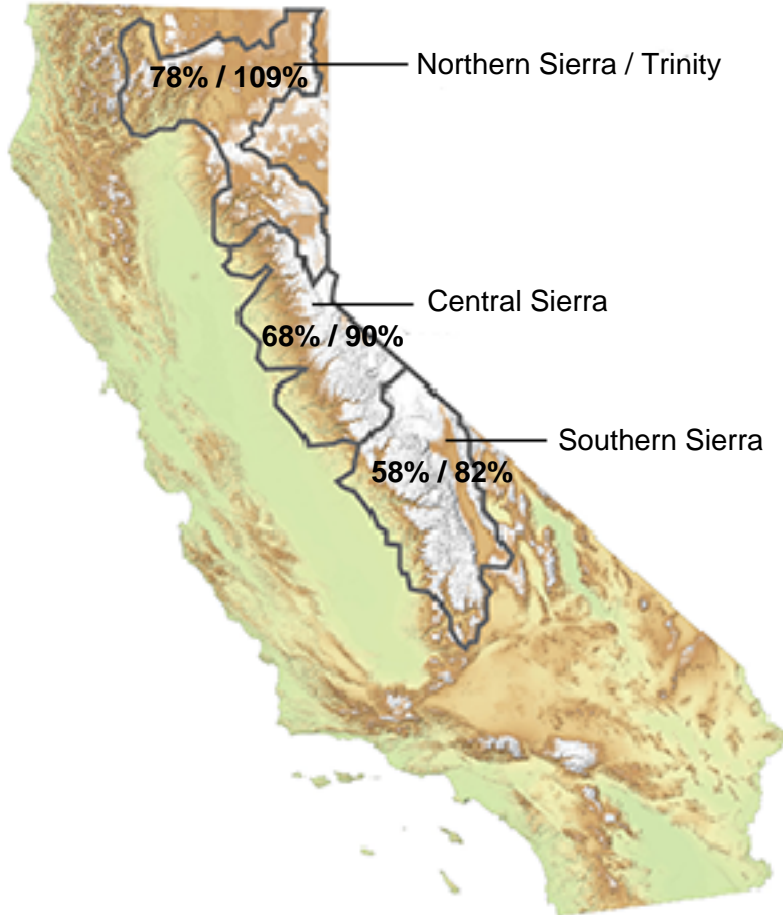

State hears feedback on controversial water plan

Bay-Delta Plan could leave Solano high and dry

SACRAMENTO— As the California State Water Resources Control board meets at the California Environmental Protection Agency Headquarters for three days of discussion on its Bay-Delta Water Quality Control Plan Solano County water officials are there to speak in opposition to a course of action that could see the county's water allocation from Lake Berryessa cut by 75 percent.

Chris Lee and Alex Rabidoux of the Solano County Water Agency presented information regarding the growth of salmon populations in Putah Creek in recent years. The state has claimed that diminished river flows in these areas are harming fish habitats and are ecologically detrimental to the water system as a whole, but SCWA argues that Putah Creek is already a standout example of salmon repopulation.

The unimpaired flows recommended in the state's draft plan would drastically alter Solano County's water portfolios, leaving the county with just 25 percent of the surface water it works with now, and creating a potential scarcity for municipal water systems. While the county is in good shape compared to others across the region about groundwater access, Lee said, the impacts could be severe.

"It would impact all of our large cities in Solano, our agricultural community, and it's not just a haircut of water, it's a dramatic change to our water portfolio," Rabidoux said. "It would have building moratoriums, it would economically impact our community, it would impact Travis Air Force Base and their reliable water supply. It just would really turn our county upside-down."

Spanning hundreds of miles from north of Lake Shasta to Fresno, the tributaries of the Sacramento and Sac Joaquin rivers that feed into the San Francisco Bay reach well into the Sierra Nevadas and Central Valley. The draft plan calls for 55 percent unimpaired flows of water through the area and would mandate a minimum level of 900,000 acre-feet in Lake Berryessa for cold water storage supply for the Sacramento River, leaving Solano County cities' agriculture with even less in drought years.

The draft report of the plan came out last fall, Lee said, and local organizations across the Bay-Delta watershed expressed concerns about what it could mean. This week's meetings are focused on what the policy could look like, and how pitfalls could be avoided.

"We're pretty excited locally in Solano County about what we're already doing on Putah Creek," Rabidoux said.

SCWA has worked hard alongside UC Davis, Yolo County and other stakeholders to improve salmon habitat in Putah Creek, Lee said, and has come a long way in that effort. Following reconstruction, cold water now extends much further down Putah Creek than it previously did, which has brought salmon populations back. While SCWA is happy to work alongside the state, he said, they already believe they have a success story on their hands.

A decision on this issue will not be made until later this year or early next year, Lee said, but the public must provide their input to the state regarding the decision. This plan has been on the top of the radar for city water managers in Solano County, Rabidoux said, especially after SCWA was able to give presentations on the issue at several city council meetings in the county.

"The common theme behind many of these boards is, 'The state can't be serious. They cannot seriously be imposing such drastic impacts to Solano County,'" he said.

SCWA has worked on habitat restoration, fish passage issues, and more over the years to make the creek more habitable for chinook fall run salmon, Rabidoux said, and the fish now return to Putah Creek each year at higher levels than they used to. The county is also looking at working with UC Davis at their Putah Creek Riparian Reserve to further improve habitats in the area. Ultimately, he said, a plan that simply increases flow without considering other metrics or concerns cannot be as effective as the more comprehensive, holistic approach that SCWA would like to see the state take.

“It’s really a story of more than just flow,” he said. “It’s flow, it’s habitat. it’s science, it’s monitoring, that really then makes a comprehensive picture.”

The North Bay Watershed Association (NBWA) is a group of 18 regional and local public agencies located throughout Marin, Sonoma, and Napa Counties. The NBWA brings together regulated North Bay public agencies to address issues of common interest that cross political boundaries and to promote stewardship of the North Bay watershed resources. NBWA Board of Directors' Meetings are held once a month, usually on the first Friday of the month ([meeting information](#)). All meetings are open to the public.

The March 1, 2024, meeting was a hybrid meeting with in-person attendance at the Town of Sonoma City Hall. Because of state budget constraints, Eileen White, Executive Officer of the San Francisco Bay Regional Water Board joined NBWA by zoom to present SFBWRB Strategic Workplan Overview and North Bay Priorities.

The NBWA 2024 conference "Imagine Our Future North Bay" was the first in-person conference since Covid-19. It was held at Sonoma State University campus. This conference was a hybrid with some virtual speakers. The conference envisioned tomorrow's resilient watershed communities and workforce, focusing on the theme "Imagine Our Future North Bay". Many of the panels explored in greater depth issues that the NBWA Board heard during the last year including California's Water Plan Update, advancement and funding of natural and build infrastructure initiatives and foster diverse opportunities for tomorrow's rewarding careers in water. The NBWA annual conferences are noted for providing a platform for experts, decision-makers, practitioners, partners, and students to understand and discuss the substantial adaptation challenges faced by water utilities and management agencies posed by climate technology, and societal changes. **For more information please view the [event program](#) and [Speaker Bios](#).**

Congress Member Jared Huffman joined the conference remotely due to the congressional funding vote scheduled for the next day for Ukraine, Israel and Taiwan. Congressman Huffman emphasized the focus on disadvantage communities in rural areas and water quality issues – environmental justice. He noted that much of the IRA funding is dependent on connecting the benefits for the official and unofficial DACs. He discussed the need to plan for and implement climate change impacts and encouraged the North Bay to seek funding from the federal Infrastructure Recovery Act (IRA) and bipartisan funding. He discussed in detail the issue with the decommissioning of the Porter Valley PG&E hydropower dam systems and supported continued water diversions from the Eel River to the Russian River as well as viable fish recovery. Congress Member Huffman was generally upbeat about most topics except SR 37 in which he noted the "blue carbon storage (wetlands and protected waters) on the west side but business as usual by

CalTrans on the eastside. [Later in the Q&A Supervisor Susan Gorin described the billions needed to achieve the goals of SR 37 to be improved for commuters and to protect and enhance the wetlands]. Huffman lamented other congressional activities.

California Water Plan Panel

The California Water Plan, updated every five years, is the State’s strategic plan for sustainably and equitably managing and developing water resources for current and future generations. California Water Plan Update 2023 (Update 2023) promotes climate resilience across regions and water sectors with a statewide vision, clear goals, watershed planning framework and toolkit, and progress-tracking dashboard of indicators. It also includes updated resource management strategies, regional planning and performance tracking tools, water balances, future scenarios, and other technical and policy-related activities related to water resilience and sustainability.

The California Department of Water Resources (DWR) has released the final version of [California Water Plan Update 2023](#). This plan can now be used by water managers, water districts, cities and counties, and Tribal communities, to inform and guide the use and development of water resources in the state. To match the pace of climate change impacts, California must move smarter, faster, and collaboratively to update our water systems. To accomplish this, Update 2023 builds on the [Water Resilience Portfolio](#), and [California’s Water Supply Strategy](#) to ensure a more climate-resilient future for the state’s water supplies.

Update 2023 promotes a vision where: “All Californians benefit from water resources that are sustainable, resilient to climate change, and managed to achieve shared values and connections to our communities and the environment.” To tackle this ambitious vision, Update 2023 focuses on three intersecting themes: addressing climate urgency, strengthening watershed resilience, and achieving equity in water management.

This update weaves equity throughout the document and dedicates a full chapter to this very important topic. Addressing these equity challenges is crucial for climate adaptation and community resilience for all who live in California and is in accordance with [Governor Newsom’s Executive Order N-16-22](#) which directs State agencies to take critical actions and address equity in all strategic plans and updates.

For the first time ever in a California Water Plan, an entire chapter is dedicated to the challenges, strengths, and resources of California Native American Tribes. Chapter 7, “Strengths and Resources of California Native American Tribes” was co-authored by members of the California Water Plan Tribal Advisory Committee consisting of Tribal Chairs, members, and representatives.

Update 2023 has been informed by a diverse group of communities of interest and place. The feedback and suggestions DWR received were included in the final plan. [Materials](#)

1. Bay -Delta Voluntary Agreements & State Board Workshop
 Alex Rabidoux (SCWA) shared that the Solano Water Advisory Commission (Commission) met on Monday to coordinate comments to the State Water Resources Control Board for the multiday public workshop held this week from April 24-26. Solano County Water Agency (SCWA) and Solano Irrigation (SID) are agencies that plan to present comments. SCWA will focus on the success of the work done on Putah Creek. The City of Vallejo will also comment, mainly on the impacts that the proposed flow amendment to the Delta by the State will have on Disadvantaged Communities. Technical comments are likely to be taken over the summer.

2. SP-NBA Intertie Project:

With the proposed intertie, Suisun City would be able to get their NBA allocation and help agencies maximize their carryover. The intertie would connect SID's Dally system and allow interconnection between the Solano Project and the NBA. The intertie would be within an existing SID easement where an open canal exists.

3. Water Accounting Update:
 Alex Rabidoux (SCWA) shared with the Commission that the North of Delta allocation increased to 65% and the South of Delta allocation increased to 40%.

SCWA is looking to confirm if the maximum percent of an agency's annual entitlement that can be stored is based on the North of Delta or South of Delta allocation.

BACKGROUND:

The management of water resources on Putah Creek is a long-term responsibility of the Water Agency. The collection of monitoring data, such as flow and water storage, pre-dates the formation of the Water Agency in 1989. Annual fish species monitoring started in 1991. The Putah Creek Accord mandated additional biological monitoring in 2000. Today, the Water Agency has improved and maintained additional data collection and scientific studies beyond that mandated by the Accord, to better manage the resource and protect water rights. With UC Davis also using Putah Creek as a teaching and research laboratory, the combined long-term monitoring record is world-class, pushing the understanding of how an ecological resource can be restored with minimal amounts of additional water. Putah Creek is a major success story, a story told with long-term monitoring data.

The 2024 Putah Creek Monitoring Data Summit is a one-day meeting where Water Agency consultants and contracting scientists and engineers can meet with Water Agency staff to plan and coordinate the collection, storage, and interpretation of decades of monitoring data (in more than a dozen categories). This year, special attention was given to better estimate adult and juvenile salmon populations and to improve coordination with neighboring programs, such as DWR's Yolo Bypass Fish Monitoring Program. (The lower 4 miles of Putah Creek passes through the Yolo Bypass).

SUBJECT: Solano RCD Highschool Biomonitoring Presentation

RECOMMENDATIONS:

High School students participating in the Solano RCD Biomonitoring program will provide a presentation to the Board about their experience with the program.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

BACKGROUND:

By participating in the biomonitoring program, students become part of the Solano Resource Conservation District's ongoing Solano County Biomonitoring Program. Since the program began in 2008, thousands of local high school students have monitored the health of Solano County's waterways located in the Sacramento River, Suisun Marsh, Carquinez Strait, and San Pablo Bay watersheds.

For this project, principles of stream ecology are used to test the relationship between the living (biotic) and non-living (abiotic) parts of an aquatic ecosystem. Specifically, students assess the condition of a creek's riparian habitat, test its chemical properties, and conduct a bioassessment to determine the number and types of aquatic macroinvertebrates living in the water. Because different types of aquatic macroinvertebrates have different sensitivities to pollution, they act as an indicator species from which we can interpret current water conditions.

This Biomonitoring Program provides an opportunity for students to participate in field work that they can include on their resume. They perform data collection and data analysis, both of which could be listed as volunteer experience, especially if they are interested in academic and career paths in the sciences.

Summary: Current law requires the State Water Resources Control Board to adopt a model water well, cathodic protection well, and monitoring well drilling and abandonment ordinance implementing certain standards for water well construction, maintenance, and abandonment and requires each county, city, or water agency, where appropriate, to adopt a water well, cathodic protection well, and monitoring well drilling and abandonment ordinance that meets or exceeds certain standards. Under current law, if a county, city, or water agency, where appropriate, fails to adopt an ordinance establishing water well, cathodic protection well, and monitoring well drilling and abandonment standards, the model ordinance adopted by the state board is required to take effect, and is required to be enforced by the county or city and have the same force and effect as if adopted as a county or city ordinance. This bill would require a local enforcement agency, as defined, to perform specified activities at least 30 days before determining whether to approve a permit for a new large-diameter, high-capacity well, as defined. By imposing additional requirements on a local enforcement agency, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program. The bill would require, if the proposed large-diameter, high-capacity well is to be located in an area subject to management by a groundwater sustainability agency, the applicable groundwater sustainability agency, upon notice of a permit application, to provide specified information to the local enforcement agency, including, but not limited to, the name of the applicable groundwater sustainability agency, the agency manager and contact information, and the applicable sustainable management criteria related to groundwater levels, including the groundwater level measurable objectives and minimum thresholds. The bill would require a local enforcement agency, before approving a permit for a large-diameter, high capacity well, to provide specified information to the applicant. The bill would prescribe certain standards a local enforcement agency would be required to follow in the approval or denial of the permit, including the location of the proposed large-diameter, high capacity well and specified geological and water supply considerations. The bill would provide exemptions for its provisions for specified water wells. The bill would provide that its provisions apply only to applications for permits for the construction, maintenance, abandonment, or destruction of water wells in basins identified in the Department of Water Resources Bulletin 118.

Summary: Current law, except as provided, authorizes any owner or tenant of land or property that is being damaged or destroyed or is in danger of being damaged or destroyed by certain animals, including, among others, the beaver, to apply to the Department of Fish and Wildlife for a permit to kill the animals. Under current law, it is unlawful for any person to trap any fur-bearing mammal for purposes of recreation or commerce in fur. Under existing law, a violation of the Fish and Game Code, or of any rule, regulation, or order made or adopted under that code, is a crime. This bill would require the department to, through consultation with beaver restoration program partners, as defined,

develop a program to promote beaver restoration across California, as provided.

Summary: The California Constitution specifies various requirements with respect to the levying of assessments and property-related fees and charges by a local agency, including notice, hearing, and protest procedures, depending on the character of the assessment, fee, or charge. Current law, known as the Proposition 218 Omnibus Implementation Act, prescribes specific procedures and parameters for local jurisdictions to comply with these requirements. This bill would prohibit, if a local agency complies with specified procedures, a person or entity from bringing a judicial action or proceeding alleging noncompliance with the constitutional provisions for any new, increased, or extended fee or assessment, as defined, unless that person or entity has timely submitted to the local agency a written objection to that fee or assessment that specifies the grounds for alleging noncompliance, as specified. This bill would provide that local agency responses to the timely submitted written objections shall go to the weight of the evidence supporting the agency's compliance with the substantive limitations on fees and assessments imposed by the constitutional provisions.

Summary: Current law requires the Natural Resources Agency, in implementing actions to achieve the goal to conserve at least 30% of the state's lands and coastal waters by 2030 established by executive order, to prioritize specified actions. Current law requires the Secretary of the Natural Resources Agency to prepare and submit an annual report to the Legislature on the progress made during the prior calendar year toward achieving that goal, as provided. Current law requires that annual report to include certain information, including, among other information, the progress made in the prior calendar year to address equity as part of the above-described goal. This bill, the Wildlife Connectivity and Climate Adaptation Act of 2024, would additionally require the agency, as part of that report, to identify key wildlife corridors, as defined, in the state, connections between large blocks of natural areas and habitats, progress on protecting additional acres of wildlife corridors, and goals for wildlife corridor protection in the next 5 years, as provided.

Summary: The Porter-Cologne Water Quality Control Act establishes a statewide program for the control of the quality of all the waters in the state and makes certain legislative findings and declarations. Existing law defines the term "beneficial uses" for the purposes of water quality as certain waters of the state that may be protected against quality degradation, to include, among

others, domestic, municipal, agricultural, and industrial supplies. This bill would add findings and declarations related to California tribal communities and the importance of protecting tribal water use, as those terms are defined. The bill would add tribal water uses as waters of the state that may be protected against quality degradation for purposes of the defined term "beneficial uses."

Summary: Existing law, the Keene-Nejedly California Wetlands Preservation Act, requires the Natural Resources Agency to prepare a plan for the acquisition, protection, preservation, restoration, and enhancement of wetlands, including funding requirements and the priority status of specific proposed wetlands projects. By Executive Order No. W-59-93, former Governor Pete Wilson declared it to be the policy of the state that its Comprehensive Wetlands Policy rests on three primary objectives, including the objective of ensuring no overall net loss and long-term net gain in the quantity, quality, and permanence of wetlands acreage and values, as provided. This bill would declare that it is the policy of the state to ensure no net loss and long-term gain in the quantity, quality, and permanence of wetlands acreage and values in California. The bill would make related legislative findings and declarations.

This measure would require the Treasurer to annually transfer an amount equal to 1.5% of all state revenues from the General Fund to the California Water Resiliency Trust Fund, which the measure would create. Summary: Current law requires the Department of Water Resources to update every 5 years the plan for the orderly and coordinated control, protection, conservation, development, and use of the water resources of the state, which is known as "The California Water Plan." Current law requires the department to include a discussion of various strategies in the plan update, including, but not limited to, strategies relating to the development of new water storage facilities, water conservation, water recycling, desalination, conjunctive use, water transfers, and alternative pricing policies that may be pursued in order to meet the future needs of the state. Current law requires the department to establish an advisory committee to assist the department in updating the plan. This bill would revise and recast certain provisions regarding The California Water Plan to, among other things, require the department to instead establish a stakeholder advisory committee and to expand the membership of the committee to include tribes, labor, and environmental justice interests. The bill would require the department to coordinate with the California Water Commission, the State Water Resources Control Board, other state and federal agencies as appropriate, and the stakeholder advisory committee to develop a comprehensive plan for addressing the state's water needs and meeting specified long-term water supply targets established by the bill for purposes of The California Water Plan. The bill would require the plan to provide recommendations and strategies to ensure enough water supply for all designated beneficial uses.

Summary: The California Public Records Act requires state and local agencies to make their records available for public inspection, except as specified. Current law requires each agency, within 10 days of a request for a copy of records, to determine whether the request seeks copies of disclosable public records in possession of the agency and to promptly notify the person of the determination and the reasons therefor. Current law authorizes that time limit to be extended by no more than 14 days under unusual circumstances, and defines "unusual circumstances" to include certain circumstances. This bill would revise the unusual circumstances under which the time limit may be extended to include the need to search for, collect, appropriately examine, and copy records during a state of emergency, as defined, proclaimed by the Governor when the state of emergency has affected the agency's ability to timely respond to requests due to decreased staffing or closure of the agency's facilities, except as specified.
