Staff will provide an update on the Bay Delta Water Quality Control Plan.

On August 19, 2026, the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) released a revised draft to the Water Quality Control Plan for the San Francisco Bay/Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta (Plan). Written comments are due on September 18, 2026. The State Water Board will consider adoption of the final draft Plan and final Staff Report at an upcoming public meeting on October 28-29, 2026, where interested persons will have the opportunity to provide oral comments.

The State Water Board's Plan has two alternatives. There is the Unimpaired Flows alternative, which would include each of the Sacramento River Watershed tributaries including Putah Creek. For Solano County, the staff report identified that the Unimpaired Flows also called the regulatory pathway would significantly reduce water supplies from the Solano Project, North Bay Aqueduct, Vallejo Permit Water, Reclamation District No. 2068, and North Delta Water Agency which would be detrimental to Solano County's urban, industrial, and agricultural community.

The second alternative, supported by the Governor and the California Natural Resources Agency, is the Healthy Rivers and Landscape Program (i.e., Voluntary Agreements). Rather than just flow increases, the Healthy Rivers and Landscape Program proposes additional flows, restoration efforts, and scientific monitoring as a more holistic approach to help declining fish species in the Bay-Delta. Water Agency staff have been actively engaged with the Department of Water Resources, SWRCB, and local agencies across the Sacramento River watershed for several years now on moving the Healthy Rivers and Landscape Program forward, as a more reasonable and thoughtful approach to the Bay-Delta Plan update.

AB 2449 Provides Remote Options for Public Agencies

Despite the end of the COVID-19 pandemic, public agencies still have options available to them if they need to exercise remote participation for members of their legislative bodies. AB 2449 provides that if a quorum of the legislative body participates in person, a member of a legislative body may participate remotely so long as the member provides prompt notice and the need for remote participation falls under one of the statutorily defined exceptions. The member does not need to identify their location nor ensure it is accessible to the public.

Members of legislative bodies can use AB 2449 to participate remotely if there is “just cause” or if “emergency circumstances” exist. “Just cause” is defined as any of the following:

- Providing childcare or caregiving of a parent, grandparent, grandchild, sibling, spouse, or domestic partner that requires the member to participate remotely.
- A contagious illness that prevents attendance in person.
- Tending to a need related to a physical or mental disability.
- Travelling for business of the legislative body or another state or local agency.

“Emergency circumstances” are defined as follows:

- A physical or family medical emergency that prevents a member of a legislative body from attending in person.

Notice Must be Provided to Utilize AB 2449’s Provisions

In order to utilize the provisions of AB 2449, members of a legislative body must inform their public agency at the earliest possible opportunity of their need to participate remotely, which can include before the start of the meeting. The member must also provide a general description of the circumstances that require remote participation. In the case of emergency circumstances, the member must actually request that the legislative body allow them to participate remotely and the legislative body has to take action on this request.

Any member participating remotely because of just cause or emergency circumstances must publicly disclose at the meeting before any action is taken, whether any other individuals 18 years of age or older are present in the room at the remote location with the member, and the general nature of the member’s relationship with any such individuals.

Members and Public Must have Option to Participate in Meetings both Audibly and Visually

When a member participates remotely, he/she must utilize both audio and visual capabilities to effectuate compliance with the statute. Therefore, members of public agencies cannot use a call in only option to attend meetings, they must be on camera. Additionally, the legislative body is responsible for ensuring that the public can also participate in meetings remotely. This includes providing a way for the public to remotely hear, visually observe, and remotely address the legislative body. Furthermore, members of the public can no longer be required to submit their comments prior to the meeting but instead must be allowed to give comments in real time.

CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order by Chair Hernandez at 6:30 pm.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

On a motion by Mayor Okamura and a second by Director Kluge the Board unanimously approved by roll call vote the agenda.

PUBLIC COMMENT

There was no public comment.

CONSENT ITEMS

On a motion by Mayor Bird and a second by Director Holdener the Board unanimously approved by roll call vote all of the consent items, except for item (F) Sale of Surplus Property.

- (A) Minutes
- (B) Expenditure Approvals
- (C) Financial Report Approval
- (D) Adoption of Legally Required Policies
- (E) Authorization to Close Safety Deposit Box at BMO Bank
- (G) Contract for SP-PDD02 Radial Gates Rehabilitation Project
- (H) Contract for Golden Mussel Veliger Toxicity Testing
- (I) Lake Berryessa Concessionaire Boat Inspection Reimbursement Program Grant

Director Holdener asked whether a policy could be developed to provide member agencies with a First Right of Refusal for surplus property offered for sale or auction by the Water Agency. General Manager Lee explained that staff could work with legal counsel to develop appropriate language for a future policy.

On a motion by Director Kluge and a second by Mayor Young the Board unanimously approved by roll call vote item (F) Sale of Surplus Property with the inclusion that staff develop a policy to allow member agencies the First Right of Refusal on surplus property from the Water Agency.

BOARD MEMBER REPORTS

Chair Hernandez shared that she was sworn in as the alternate committee member for the Delta Protection Commission. Mayor Okamura remains the voting member.

GENERAL MANAGERS REPORT

There were no additional updates to the written report.

SOLANO WATER ADVISORY COMMISSION REPORT

There were no updates from the Commission.

PROCUREMENT POLICY UPDATE

General Manager Chris Lee provided an overview of the Water Agency's procurement policy and explained that the policy establishes limits on what the General Manager may approve without returning to the Board. The current policy allows the General Manager to approve professional services contracts up to \$100,000 when the work is within the approved budget. Staff recommended increasing that limit to \$200,000 for professional services so that routine, previously budgeted work could proceed without requiring a Board meeting when no other business required Board action. Staff explained that contracts would continue to be reviewed by General Counsel and coordinated with the Executive Committee, with the Executive Committee able to determine whether a Board meeting was necessary.

Mayor Young stated that he was not comfortable increasing the limit and preferred to retain the existing \$100,000 threshold, noting the importance of Board oversight. Supervisor Mashburn concurred and referenced prior Agency experience in which contracts and other actions had occurred without sufficient Board oversight. Mayor Sorce discussed the importance of public transparency and indicated that she was comfortable retaining the existing limit. Mayor Okamura also expressed concern about increasing the limit for contracts that may not be competitively bid.

On a motion by Mayor Young and a second by Supervisor Mashburn, the Board unanimously approved by roll call vote to keep the existing procurement policy in place.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATES

Bob Reeb, SCWA's legislative advocate, provided an update as the 2026 legislative session enters its final two weeks. Mr. Reeb reported that approximately 1,200 bills will be considered by the Legislature during the final two weeks, in addition to budget-related decisions concerning Proposition 4 appropriations and greenhouse gas reduction fund appropriations. Mr. Reeb also discussed the Governor's proposed wildfire liability framework, which has not yet been introduced as legislation. Among other provisions, the proposal could restrict local agency recovery of lost property tax revenue following a wildfire and limit compensation for public utilities whose facilities are damaged to depreciated value. Mr. Reeb noted the potential difficulty of replacing major water infrastructure at depreciated value.

Mr. Reeb also reported on potential legislative and permitting activity related to California Forever, including efforts to streamline CEQA and other permitting requirements affecting the proposed shipyard at Collinsville and manufacturing hub east of Travis Air Force Base. SCWA's legislative team has attempted to engage California Forever representatives regarding potential water supply impacts but have yet to secure discussions. Mr. Reeb reported that a Solano Mutual Water Company as part of California Forever has recently been incorporated and that project planning documents identify approximately 10,000 acre-feet of potential new groundwater production and approximately 10,000 acre-feet of surface water from Reclamation District No. 536.

Mr. Reeb further reported that SCWA is opposing unless amended, AB 1881 and AB 2218. Both bills have moved off the Senate Appropriations Committee suspense file and are expected to proceed to the Senate floor. Mr. Reeb shared that he has been working closely with Agency staff on AB 1772, which was intended to establish statewide golden mussel decontamination and quarantine standards. However, the bill has been placed in the suspense file, primarily due to high implementation costs for CDFW.

WATER POLICY UPDATES

General Manager Chris Lee shared that a new draft update to the Bay-Delta Plan is expected at the end of this month. Supervisor Mashburn provided several updates on the Delta Conservancy, Delta Protection Commission, and Delta Counties Coalition. The Delta Conservancy is pursuing legislation to expand the area of Solano County that is included within the Conservancy. The Delta Protection Commission is moving forward with litigation related to the Delta Conveyance Project, and the Delta Counties Coalition is also expected to pursue litigation. The Delta Counties Coalition is scheduled to meet with the Director of CDFW regarding resources and policies to address the golden mussel infestation.

Mayor Young asked about preparation for a potentially significant El Niño and associated flooding. General Manager Chirs Lee explained that while forecasts indicated a potentially strong event, the impact to Northern California is difficult to predict. Staff will continue to monitor conditions and be prepared to respond as the water season approaches, with additional information expected in September.

The Board entered closed session at 7:01 pm. The Board came back into open session at 7:39 pm with nothing to report.

SUBJECT: September General Manager's Report

Water Supply Update

As of September 3, Lake Berryessa is at elevation 430.15 feet, 88% full. From a water supply perspective, we are looking to be in good shape for several years to come.

Our State Water Project allocation remains at 60% for the year.

Short-term and seasonal precipitation forecasts are shown in the figures below.

El Nino Status

El Niño conditions have developed in the tropical Pacific as of early June 2026, with sea surface temperatures in some regions already exceeding 0.5°C above average (NOAA, Weather.com). Forecasters indicate a 63% probability that this El Niño could become very strong, potentially ranking among the most intense events since 1950, with some models projecting a “super” El Niño by late summer or early fall (Weather West, NOAA). Staff will continue to monitor ongoing modeling and provide updates to the Board and member agencies.

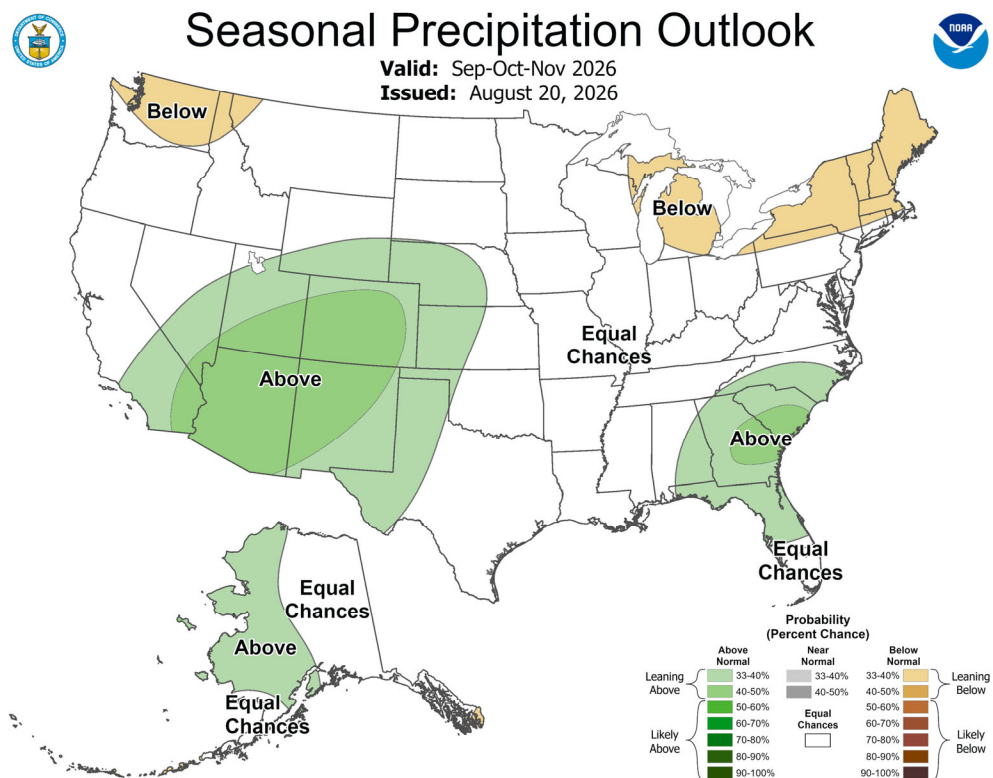
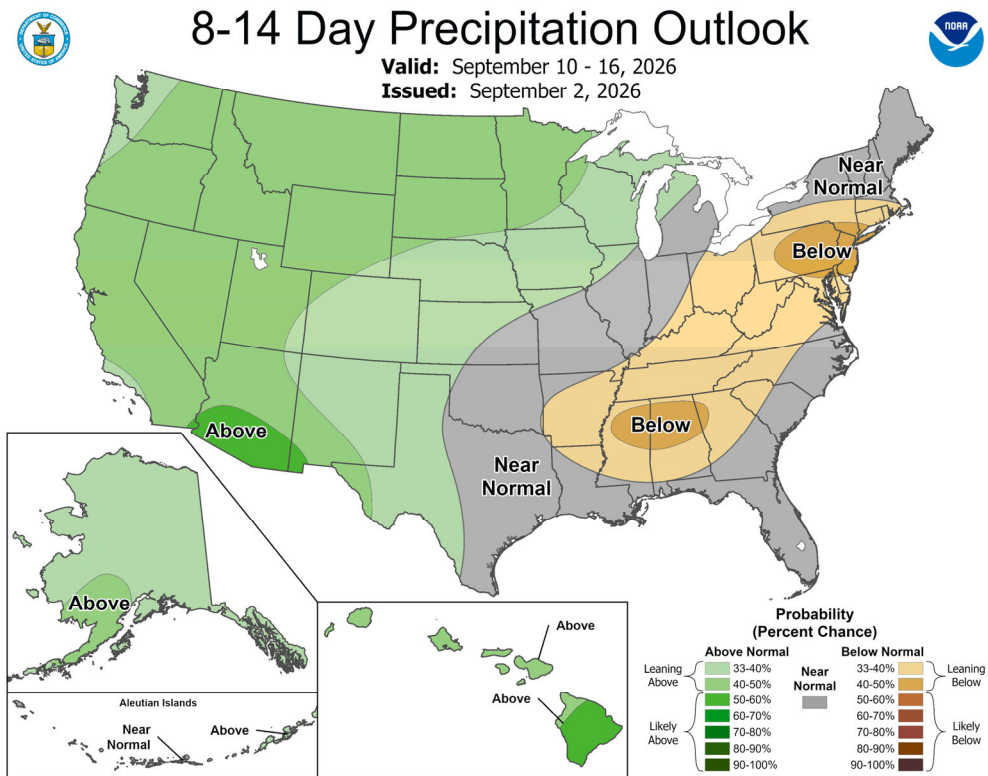
At the September Board meeting, staff will provide an overview of the Agency's flood monitoring network.

Bay Delta Plan¹ Update

On August 19, the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) released the Final draft Bay-Delta Plan, Final Staff Report, and Final Scientific Basis Report Supplement. The entire administrative record includes over 15,000 pages of reports, figures, tables, and analyses. The SWRCB has provided a 30-day comment period for any new comments since the prior draft

¹ The Bay-Delta Water Quality Control Plan is a policy document adopted by the State Water Resources Control Board that establishes water quality control measures and flow requirements needed to provide reasonable protection of the beneficial uses in the San Francisco Bay/Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta estuary.





report, with written comments due September 18. The Water Board will hear public comments and consider adoption of the final draft Bay-Delta Plan on October 28-29 (and October 30 if needed).

Water Agency staff have started reviewing the Final draft Bay-Delta Plan and Final Staff Report. The Bay-Delta Plan continues to support a dual pathway of the Healthy Rivers & Landscapes (HRL) program and the regulatory pathway. For Solano County, there have been no regionally specific changes to the regulatory pathway, including the Water Supply Adjustments and the Cold-Water Storage requirements for Lake Berryessa. This continues to be a point of concern for our Solano Project member agencies. As part of the Final Staff Report, the SWRCB formally responded to comment letters for the first time. While Water Agency staff submitted a total of 4 comment letters (2023, 2024, 2025, 2026), participated in several of the public hearings, and attended a majority of the 11 working meetings in early 2025, the SWRCB only formally responded to our most recent February 2026 comment letter as well as the public hearing. Water Agency staff are currently reviewing the SWRCB's responses to our comments and from our Solano member agencies.

At the September SCWA Board Meeting, staff will provide a more detailed presentation on the most recent Bay-Delta Plan update.

Golden Mussel Update²

Update on activities associated with the Golden Mussels and the general Mussel Education and Outreach Program:

Statistics:

Since November 25, 2024, approximately 67,000 seals have been applied, and 52,000 seals have been removed. Nearly 10,000 decontaminations have been performed at SCWA affiliated decontamination stations.

Early Detection Monitoring:

Early detection monitoring continues to be conducted on a regular frequency from the Solano Project and the State Water Project.

- Solano Project – Negative for golden mussels.
- State Water Project - Barker and Lindsay Sloughs: Continue to show positive eDNA detections. On 8/3/26, samples collected from both Barker and Lindsay Sloughs were positive for golden mussel eDNA.

² In the fall of 2024, Golden Mussels were observed in the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta. At Lake Berryessa, there are two options for launching: a 30-day quarantine after your boat is sealed with a red tag or going through the hot water decontamination process at Markley Cove or Steel Canyon Recreation Area. Lake Berryessa was the first reservoir to require decontamination of vessels coming from the Delta.

Solano County Water Agency Updates:

- Lots of tampered seals continue to be caught at Lake Berryessa.
- Draft Golden Mussel Response and Control Plan vulnerability assessment is in the final review stages and once complete, a Rapid Response Plan will be generated.
- SCWA golden mussel toxicity study focusing on a prophylactic approach targeting larval golden mussels in both the Solano Project and North Bay Aqueduct has begun.

Regional and Other Updates:

- Golden mussels have been found in Suisun Marsh in Nurse Slough and Montezuma Slough.
- Counties with local emergencies pertaining to golden mussels now include Kern, San Joaquin, Sacramento and Yolo.
- AB 1772 focusing on statewide banding and decontamination programs has been dropped.
- SCWA worked with ACWA to provide comments regarding proposed amendments to sections 650, 672, 672.1, and 672.2 of Title 14, California Code of Regulations (CCR) were submitted by ACWA on 8/18/26.
 - No proposed changes submitted by ACWA were included in the amended proposed regulatory text.
- Many control and eradication projects are taking place across the state and SCWA is involved with several working groups dedicated to collaboration and sharing information.

LPCCC Update

Protecting Salmon Protects Solano Project Water Rights

August is the time of year when the Water Agency and the Ca Department of Fish and Wildlife process environmental permits to get ready for the fall salmon run. Last year we saw a record number of salmon (2,150) and we have high hopes for this year's run. In preparation for salmon arrival, the Water Agency is again adding more than 500 tons of spawning gravel to the Creek near Winters. Last year's gravel augmentation areas were loaded with salmon. Here is a video during a staff tour in 2025 <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=awoRdQqnnOA> In 2026, the fall pulse flow is expected to start Oct 26, the beginning of this year's salmon run. And, as a reminder, the Winters Salmon Festival is the first Saturday in November, on Nov 7, 2026.

Extending Cold Water Downstream

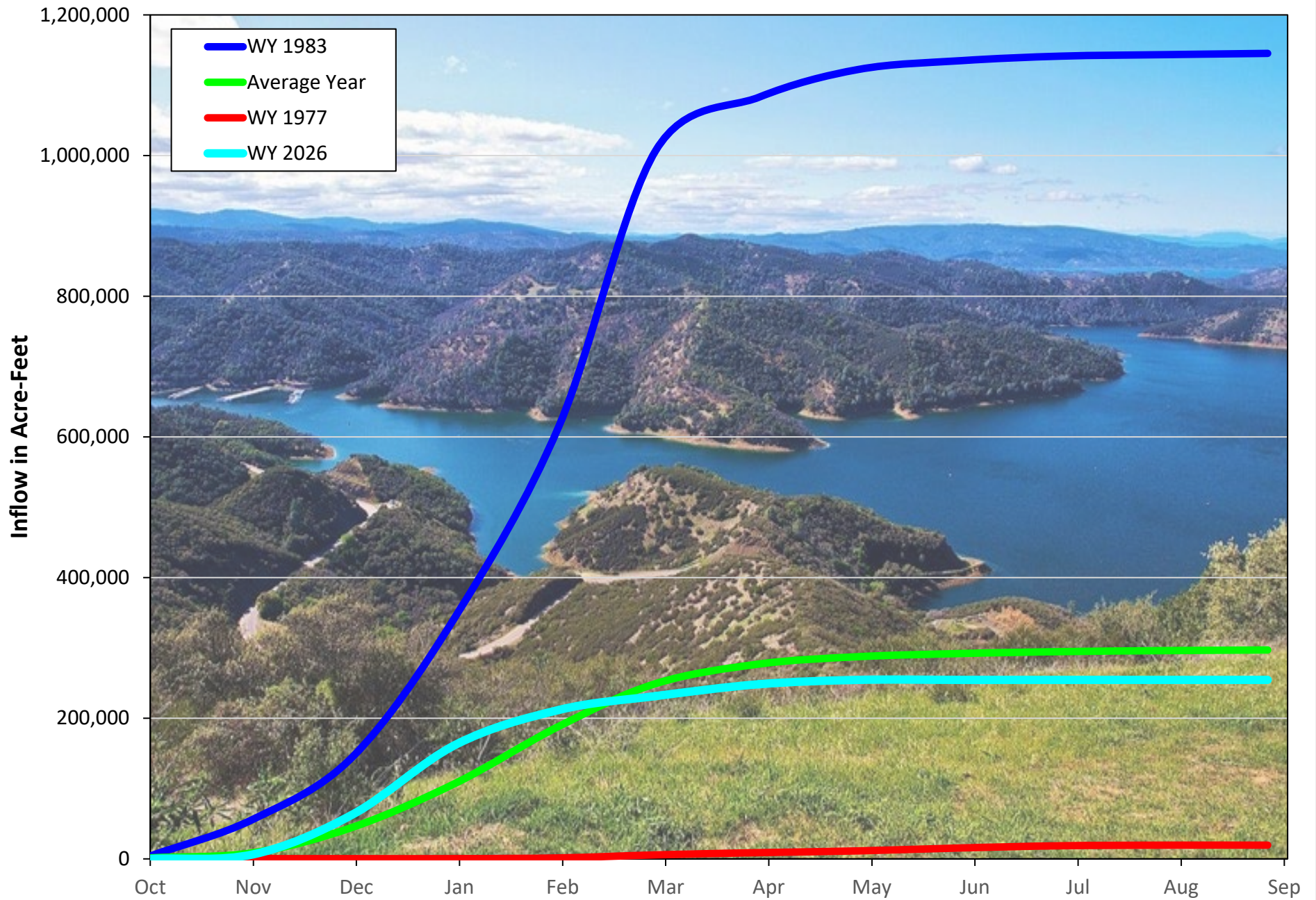
The cold water released from Lake Berryessa is perfect for native fish and salmon, but it warms up as it flows downstream. At the halfway point, around UC Davis and I-80, the water warms up too much, oxygen levels drop, and the native fish disappear. One of the goals of restoration on Putah Creek is to increase shade and make large, ponded areas narrower, more like a natural stream. This speeds up the water and it stays cooler as it moves downstream. Restoration projects like this are like a two-for-one sale. The site itself is restored, but it also propagates more cold water downstream, making better habitat downstream for free. Near Pedrick Road is the current 'Nishikawa' restoration project on Putah Creek. The Water Agency hopes to break ground next

year on this multi-year project. The Water Agency is also in the process of improving its temperature monitoring network along the entire Creek.

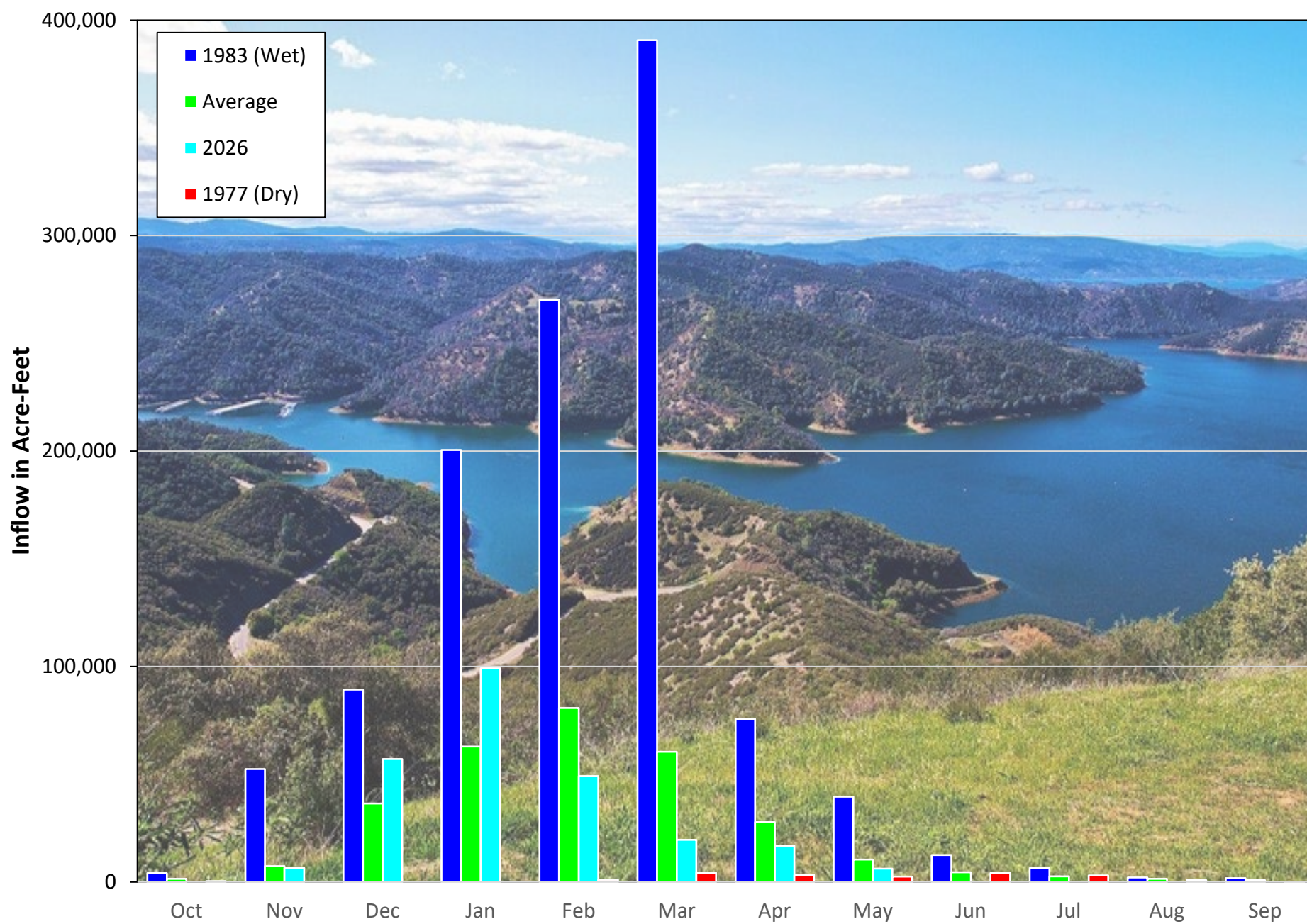
Lower Putah Creek Coordinating Committee (LPCCC) Monthly Meetings

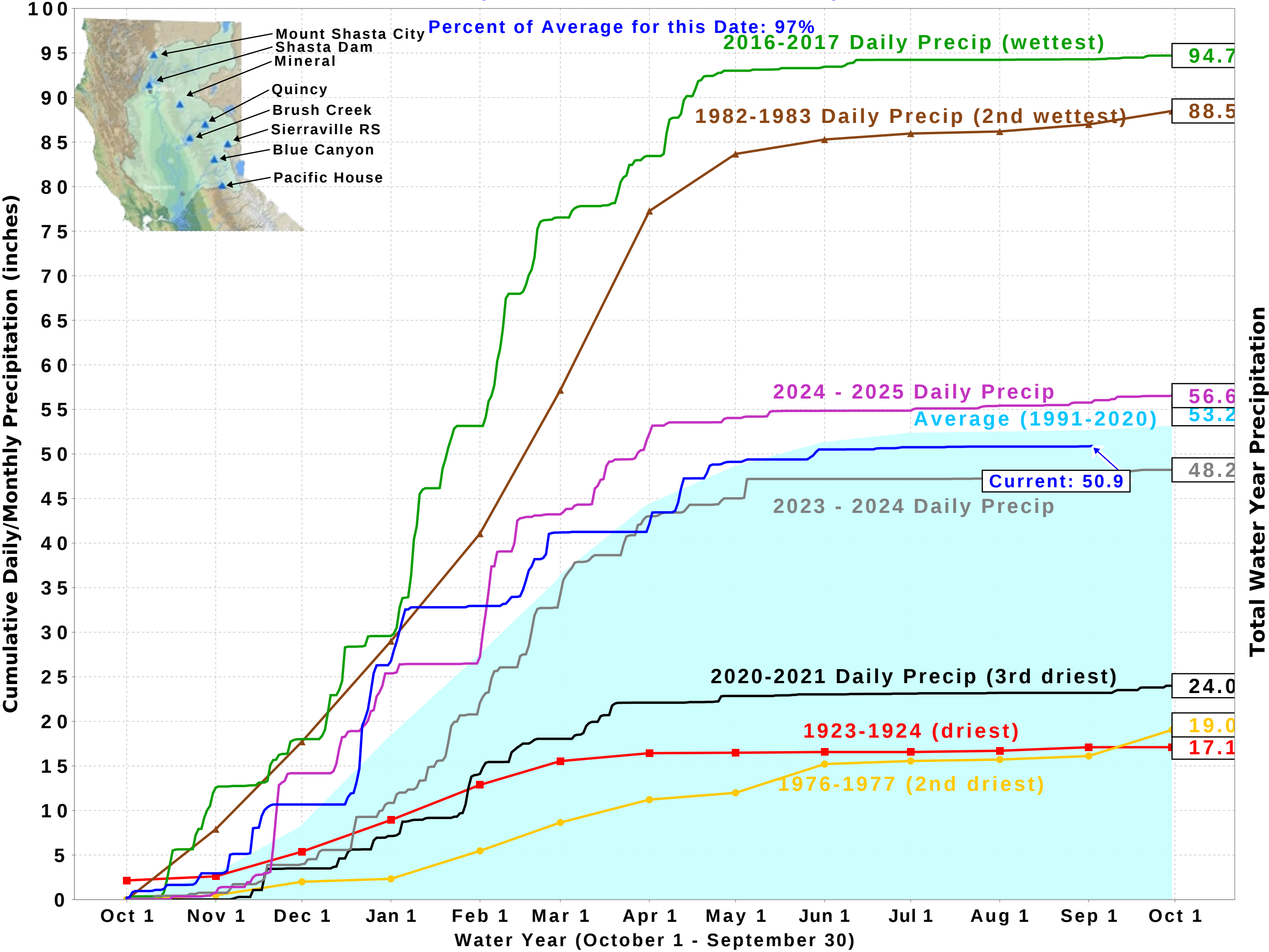
Annual Lake Berryessa Inflow

Northern Sierra Precipitation: 8-Station Index, September 02, 2026

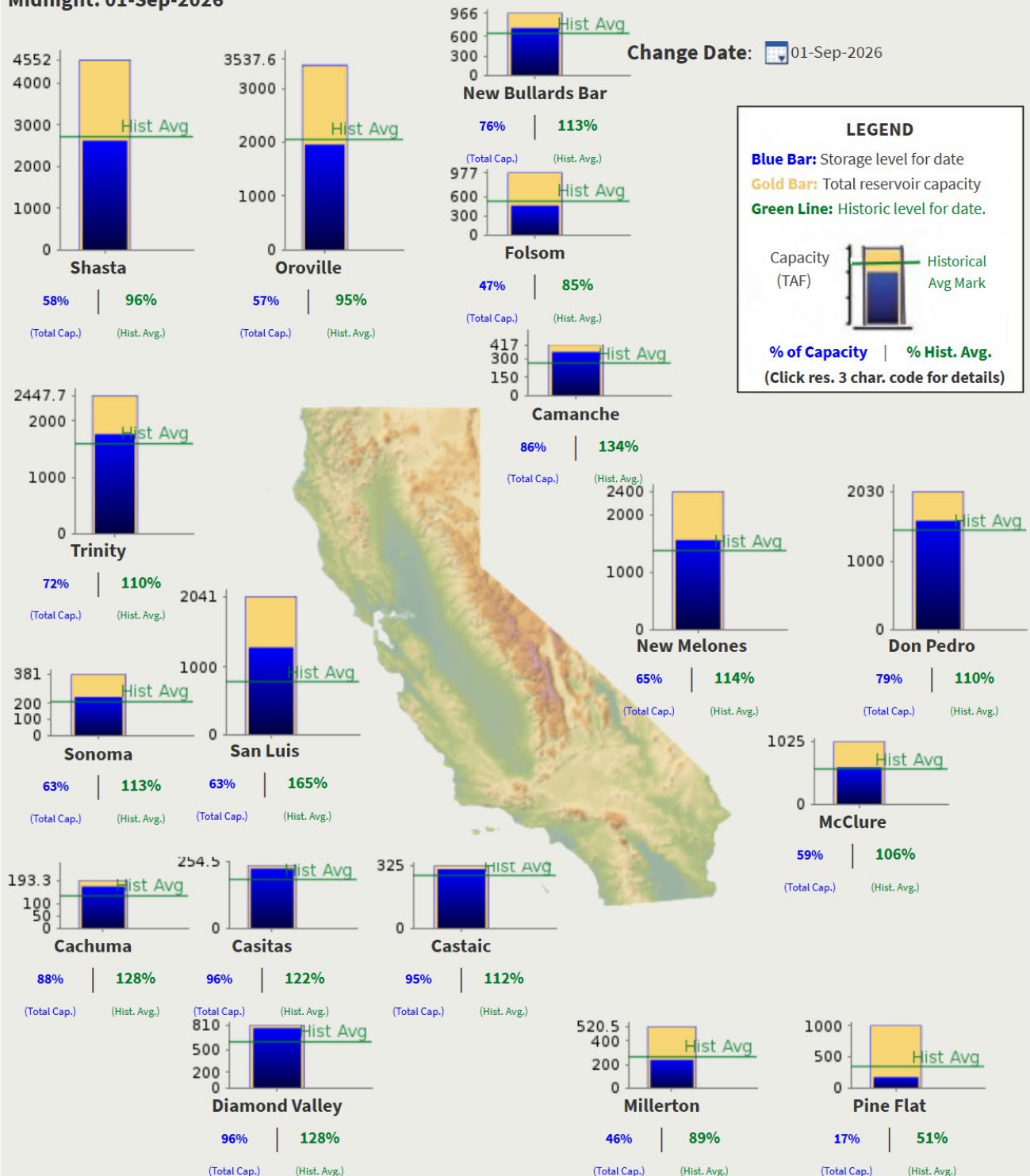

Super El Niño is looming. Here's what new data means for snow season across the west

As El Niño continues to strengthen, data is increasingly points to a clear pattern this upcoming snow season: a wet winter for California, and a warm winter for the Pacific Northwest.

We took the data behind our upcoming winter season and applied it to snow using three independent climate models.

The results give us a rough picture of a winter that features above-average snowfall for the Sierra and Northern California — especially in January. With models projecting an inch or three or extra snowfall for the first month of 2027, a below-average snow year is looking increasingly unlikely.

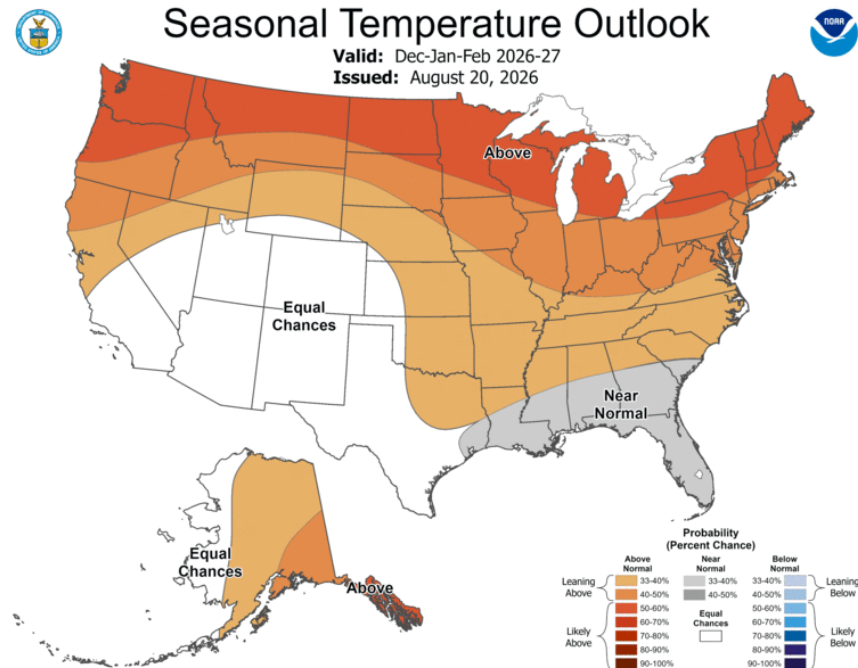
The variables that inform these projections are already informing other winter outlooks as everyone from governments to ski resorts moves to prepare for the winter on its way.

Climate Prediction Center aligns with textbook El Niño winter

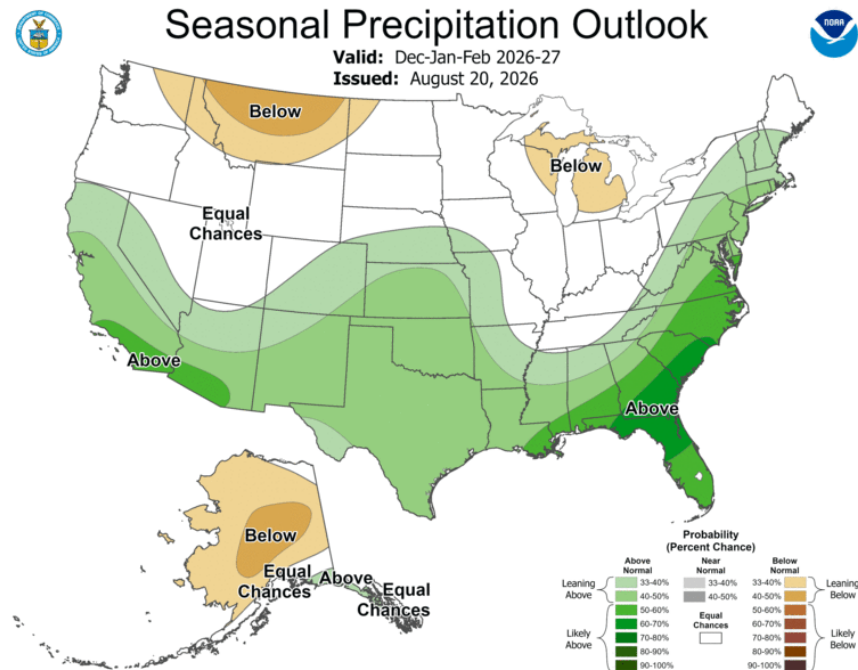
The [Climate Prediction Center's](#) latest season outlook shows warmer-than-average temperatures across the northern U.S. alongside increased precipitation for California and the southeastern U.S. — a [textbook El Niño winter pattern](#), and not surprising given this El Niño's already incredible strength.

The outlook is not just a rip from the textbook — real data is increasingly and continually backing up these expectations. Climate models [are already pointing](#)

towards [this winter scenario](#), giving us an early look at what to roughly expect months ahead of time.



The winter season temperature outlook shows above-average temperatures are more likely across the northern U.S. *Climate prediction center, NOAA*

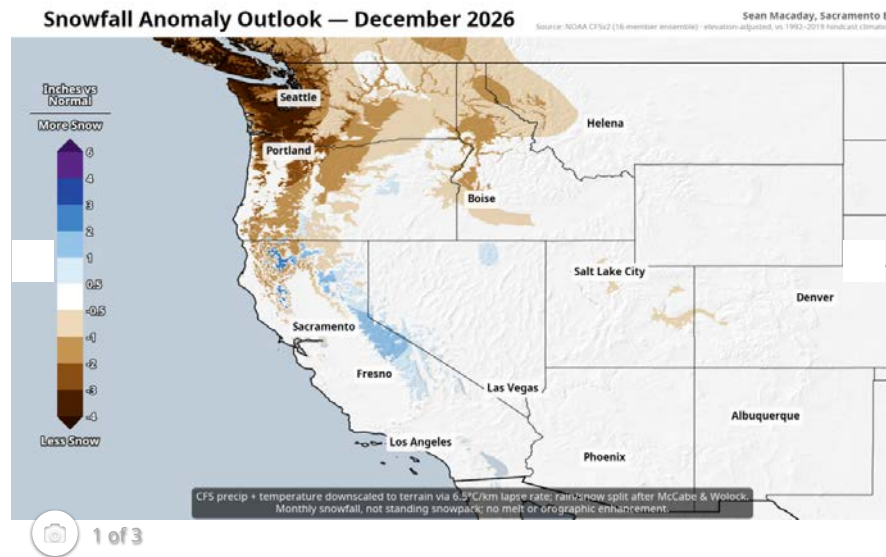


The winter season precipitation outlook shows that above-average precipitation is more likely in California and the southeast U.S. *Climate prediction center, NOAA*

It might seem nonsensical that we can predict the weather out months ahead, but the value lies in the distinction between climate and weather. The weather models that power the weather app on your phone simulate the atmosphere at each hour, out for days to a week or two. On the other hand, climate models zoom way out to simulate the overall pattern across the entire globe and consider factors such as sea surface temperatures and the jet stream. This smoothed over approach has shown skill in predicting the climate out weeks and months ahead of time.

To get the scoop of the winter headed our way, we compiled the precipitation and temperature data from three independent climate models: the National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration's Climate Forecasting System (CFSv2), the European Centre for Medium-Range Weather Forecasts Seasonal Forecasting System (SEAS5) and the North American Multi-Model Ensemble (NMME), itself a collaboration between NOAA, NASA, and other partners. Then we used elevation data to produce a loose look at what snow season has in store months ahead of time.

California, Sierra looking snowy come December and January

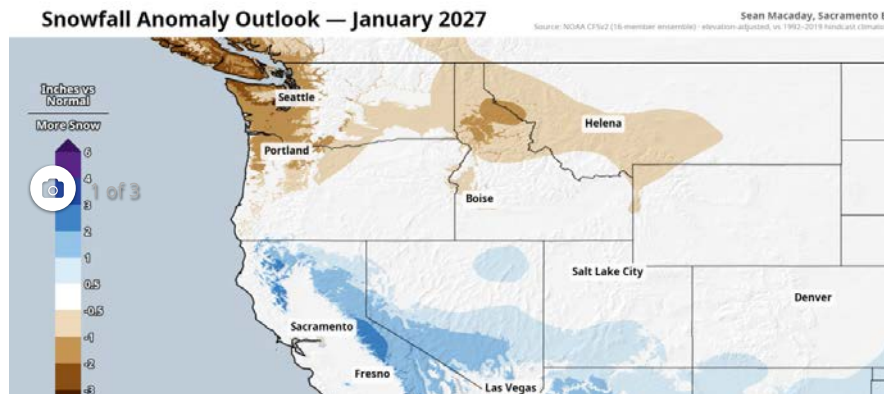


December snowfall projections

With a wet winter comes more rain than normal — that's a given. What is not is just how much of that will come as snow.

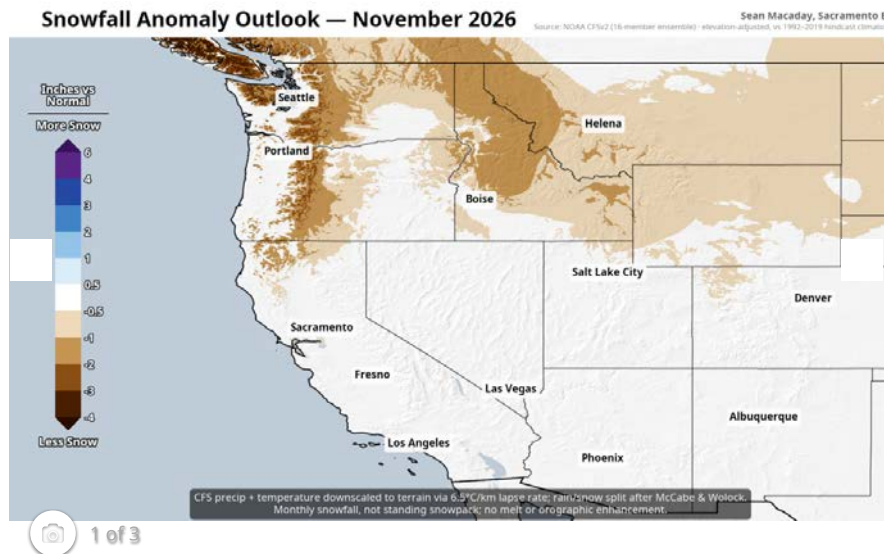
Thankfully for snow lovers, California's many mountains — from the Sierra to the Klamath — are tall enough to turn that rain to snow even during moderately warmer winters. Our projections bring above average snowfall for all three climate models across the Sierra and Northern California. The boost is especially evident during January, when the average boost is on the order of an additional few inches across the Sierra and Tahoe region.



There are, of course, a few caveats. First, this is only modeled snowfall, not standing snowpack. Warmer temperatures brought on by El Niño's extra heat could work to melt additional snowfall even at higher elevations. Indeed, both the climate prediction center's new seasonal outlook and our suite of climate models point to warmer-than-average temperatures across Northern California this winter.

This effect of this warmth is most likely to be felt at lower elevations such as in the foothills and halfway up many mountain slopes. Despite a potential for increased precipitation, warmer temperatures would shift the rain-snow line higher up the mountainside, leaving many mountain communities with rain instead.

It is also important to understand that any extra precipitation and snowfall this winter will not be as evenly spread as these climate models depict. While an inch or three of snow per month would be nice for many Sierra resorts, the nature of weather is much more localized — some places would get average snow, while others get significantly above-average snow. Below-average snowfall is increasingly unlikely this winter for many Sierra and Tahoe ski resorts.

And while winter may prove to be a wet and snowy one in time, don't expect it to come early. The extra warmth will likely translate to temperatures that hold off the

start of snow season past November and possibly even partway into December as warmth persists.

Tahoe resorts are preparing for more snow

As ski season draws closer, many are already beginning to form their winter plans on the slopes. With the outlook looking decent for the Lake Tahoe region, many ski resorts themselves are beginning to lock in.

Palisades Tahoe spokesperson Christine Horvath said the resort plans to open Nov. 25.

“Our crews are hard at work with routine maintenance and a few pretty significant new investments on the mountain that will improve the guest experience and our operation,” said Horvath. “We always go into the season with planning and optimism for a great snow year, and we are excited for the potential of what an El Niño can deliver.”

Meanwhile, the trio of Vail resorts — Northstar, Heavenly and Kirkwood — are targeting opening dates of Nov. 20 in Tahoe and Dec. 4 for Kirkwood.

“While we never know what the weather is going to bring, there’s a lot of buzz surrounding the possibility of a super El Niño this winter and our teams across Heavenly, Northstar, and Kirkwood are feeling the hype as we get ready for our target opening dates,” wrote Vail spokesperson Cole Zimmerman.

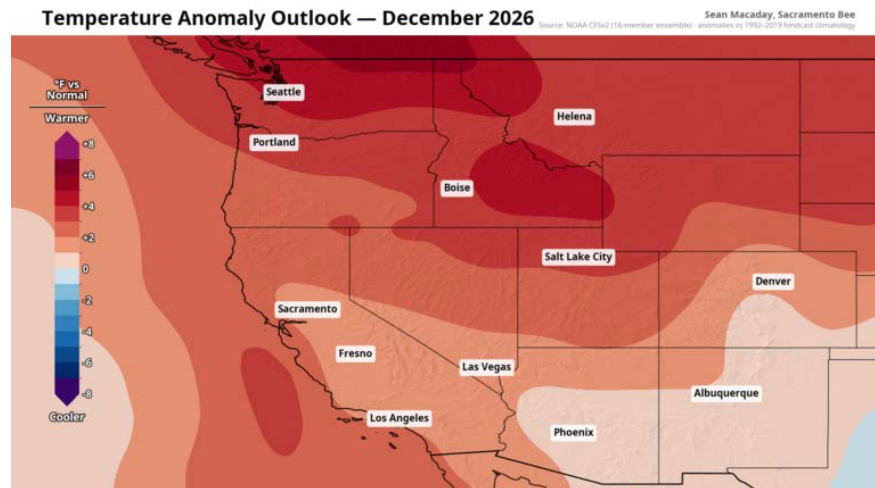
Pacific Northwest: Warmer and drier than usual

The Pacific Northwest is famous for its rainy winters. And while there are surely set to be many cloudy and drizzly days in store for Washington, Oregon and even Idaho this winter, it is looking increasingly likely there will be less of that to go around.

As El Niño remains strong into winter, its presence will pull the jet stream that normally brings rain to the northwest coast south toward California at times. The result would be a reduction in the long rainy stretches that are familiar for this corner of the country, and likely with it a reduction in typical snowfall at elevation.

Even more influential will be warmer temperatures forecast for the region. From the coast of Washington inland to Montana, above-average temperatures will very likely

shift the rain-snow line to higher elevations and melt snow faster than normal this winter season.

That's not to say that the ski season will be a dud — many popular locations are at high enough elevations to hold a decent snowpack, and any below average snowfall or more likely to be modest than severe. Still, the odds of an above-average year across this stretch of the nation are, for now, low thanks to the developing Super El Niño.

What can be more easily said is that any low-elevation snow will be increasingly unlikely during November and December across the Pacific Northwest. A rare dusting for Seattle or Portland seems improbable given the current setup.

California is about to see a sudden foot of sea level rise from El Niño. Here's when it hits

Sea levels along the California coast are expected to rise by a foot as soon as late September, as El Niño-warmed tropical water pushes a slow-moving wave up the coast of North America.

The swell isn't something seen crashing at a beach but a planetary-scale process known as a Kelvin wave that is triggered by changes in wind at the equator.

"It's not a wave you can surf," said Dillon Amaya, an assistant professor of marine science at North Carolina State University. "You're not gonna be able to see it from your boat, but our instruments will see it as it passes by, like tide gages."

The coastally-trapped Kelvin wave, as it's called, originated along the equator and hit the South America coast before turning north at about 6 mph. It raised water

levels about nine to 14 inches (relative to 1993-2025 averages) along the coast of Central America in late August. That surge will hit Cabo in late September and eventually reach San Francisco the first or second week of October.

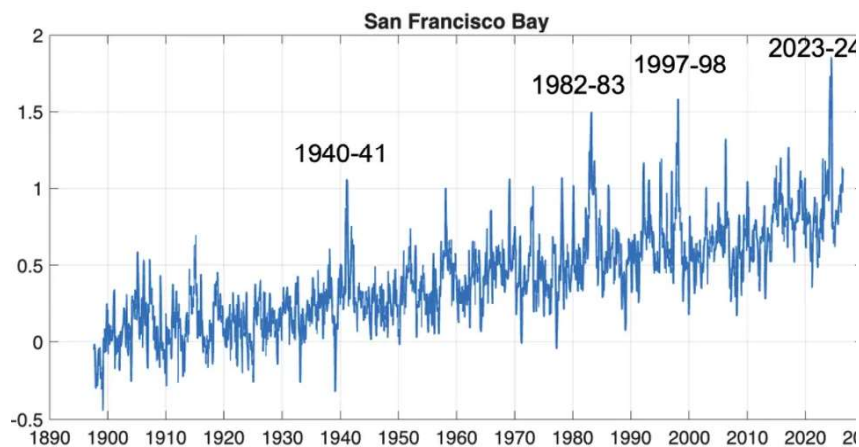
The Kelvin waves won't build on each other. Rather, sea level heights and temperatures will remain elevated for weeks, gradually subsiding before the next wave hits.

Water temperatures along the California coast are expected to increase as the wave arrives, because it will weaken coastal upwelling — the process that brings cold, deep water to the ocean surface near California. That will further warm near-shore water that is already as much as 6 degrees above normal in Southern California, according to the Scripps Institution of Oceanography.

Here's how the Kelvin wave works: During El Niño, tropical trade winds frequently reverse direction and blow out of the west instead of the east, pushing warm water toward the coast of South America. When this water — which is also a foot or so higher than normal — hits the coast, its energy slithers up the Mexico coastline through the Gulf of California, along the U.S. West Coast and all the way to Alaska. This whole process takes months.

El Niño usually induces a series of coastally-trapped waves that keep water warmer and higher than normal the entire fall and winter along the California coast.

During the most recent strong El Niño, in 2015-16, "five, maybe six occurred over a period of a year or so," Amaya said. "What we're forecasting now is just one of potentially many that are coming."

The first of these coastally-trapped waves caused San Francisco's highest summer tide on record, Amaya said. The city also saw a historically high July tide.

September and October tides are among the lowest of the year, so the sudden rise in sea levels probably won't cause immediate coastal flooding, but it is an ominous sign for winter.

California's highest king tides are predicted on Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day, with another in late January. Water levels will probably rival the highest in recorded history, even without a nearby storm.

"If we get big waves coming at the same time, (flooding) is gonna be worse," said Gary Griggs, a professor of earth sciences at UC Santa Cruz.

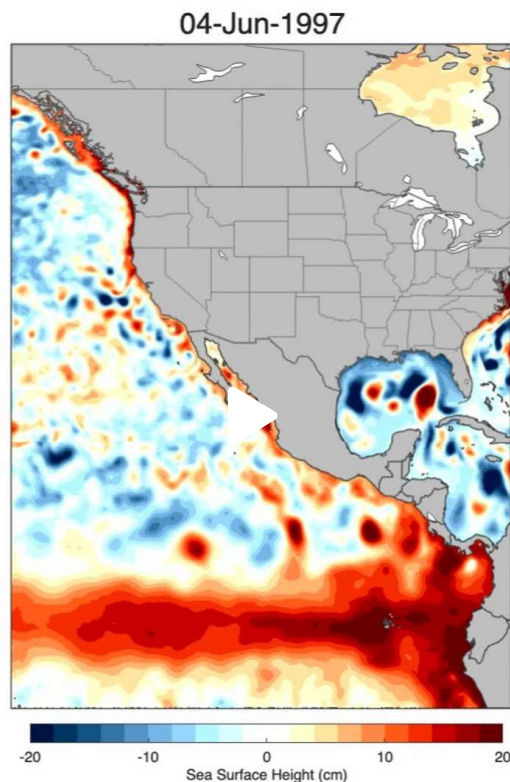
A double whammy of king tides and storm surge would be particularly problematic.

This El Niño is likely to be even stronger than the current record event in 2015-16. That year caused the worst beach erosion in 150 years along the California coast, a USGS study found. San Francisco's Ocean Beach narrowed by as much as 180 feet.

Amaya, who went to school at UC San Diego, said students use a local landmark to track El Niño.

"There is a massive rock that is just north of the pier that is completely buried by sand during non-El Niño years," he said. "During El Niño years, the wave energy is much higher. Sea levels are higher. And it erodes the beaches away and exposes the rock. It's lovingly referred to as 'Rock Niño' so that we know that El Niño is happening whenever the beach is exposing that massive rock."

Scientists have studied Kelvin waves for decades, but pseudo-real time observations were not available during previous El Niños. Now, technology has improved.

The wave will affect marine life. Mammals move around in search of fish in colder water; whales for example could seek colder water further from the coast, putting them at greater risk of being struck by ships.

While El Niño's effects on the oceans are temporary, the impacts of human-caused global warming are not.

Sea levels along the U.S. West Coast are predicted to rise 4 to 8 inches in the next three decades due to human-caused warming, according to a federal interagency report.

Already, West Coast seas have risen 9 inches to 1 foot since the late 19th century. The upcoming Kelvin wave could double that amount.

"It's almost the entire climate change anomaly in one go," Amaya said.

The meeting was called to order at 12:25 PM.

Justen Cole (Vacaville) announced that Danielle Martinez (Benicia) would be stepping down as chair and that he would serve as chair going forward.

1. Bylaws

Justen Cole (Vacaville) reported that the ad hoc committee working on the bylaws/charter had met once and was scheduled to meet again later that day. No update was available for the full commission yet.

2. Golden Mussels

Alex Rabidoux (Water Agency) reported that there were no updates regarding golden mussels.

3. Groundwater Banking

Alex Rabidoux (Water Agency) reported that the Dry Arroyo recharge test, conducted in cooperation with Solano Irrigation District (SID), did not demonstrate sufficient recharge to justify continuing the test. The Water Agency delivered approximately 2 cubic feet per second (cfs) through a temporary siphon and observed about 0.1 cfs of difference over the test reach. Staff may consider another test at Campos Lane, near the headwaters of the McCune system, subject to landowner interest. A potential effort at Herb's Place will not move forward due to permitting and other constraints.

4. Water Accounting, Transfers, Exchanges

Alex Rabidoux (Water Agency) reported that, for the current year's water transfer agreements, the smaller agreement had been returned and signed. The larger agreement is still being routed through Kern County Water Agency, and the Water Agency is awaiting the formal agreement from the Department of Water Resources (DWR). Alex stated as an action item, he would follow up with DWR.

In response to an inquiry from Justen Cole (Vacaville) regarding more potential water sales, Alex noted that he can contact the Westside water districts regarding their interest in purchasing additional water. Justen confirmed that Vacaville had previously expressed interest in an additional 2,000 acre feet. Discussion noted that if agencies have water available for sale, it may be preferable to arrange sales earlier rather than waiting until winter when there may be a rush and reduced value.

5. Bay-Delta Plan

Alex Rabidoux (Water Agency) reported that the revised Bay-Delta Plan was released and under review by staff. He noted that the State Water Resources Control Board (State Water Board) established a 30-day comment period, with comments due September 18, 2026, followed by a hearing and anticipated adoption approximately one month later. He encouraged each member agency to review the State Water Board's formal responses to their previous comments and to consider what additional comments are needed to build a technical record.

Alex noted, among other issues, the State Water Board's treatment of modeling results for the Yolo and Solano subbasins, which are combined in the model and therefore cannot be readily differentiated when evaluating groundwater impacts. He also reported on provisions concerning base flows and potential future projects, including groundwater recharge, that could result in additional State Water Board oversight or conditions. The existing Solano Project cold-water temperature and carryover requirements remain unchanged. He noted that if agencies are interested, he can send them the track changes version of the Bay-Delta Plan showing what was revised between versions.

Chris Lee (Water Agency) added that the State Water Project and Central Valley Project share concerns with the revised plan and reported that the Solano County Water Agency Board is expected to discuss the matter in closed session in September. He recommended that member agencies begin briefing their respective councils and legal counsel regarding potential next steps. Discussion followed regarding coordinating regional comments and preserving issues for potential litigation.

6. Regional Intertie Project, Update

Deborah Barr (Water Agency) reported that the Regional Intertie Project is currently in the consultant's hands. Staff are fine-tuning information provided by the Maine Prairie Water District to help determine the final alternative. The Water Agency's goal remains to have the feasibility report completed by the end of calendar year 2026.

7. Water Agency General Manager's Report

- a. Water Agency Board Items: Chris Lee (Water Agency) reported that the September Board meeting will include an update on the Bay-Delta Plan as well as discussion of

the Water Agency's previous regional comment letter and the State Water Board's responses. A closed session is expected to address potential litigation matters.

Chris reported that State Water Contractors did not meet in August. He provided an update regarding the State Water Project Incidental Take Permit (ITP) and the Fall X2 requirement, noting that the requirement was removed for the 2025 water year after additional scientific information indicated that it was not providing the anticipated habitat benefits. State Water Contractors would like to remove the requirement again and have submitted a letter to the new California Department of Fish and Wildlife department head.

Chris further reported that the State Water Contractors are continuing to move forward with Healthy Rivers and Landscapes (HRL) early implementation. A meeting regarding HRL funding was scheduled for the following day, and additional information may be available after the next Water Agency Board meeting.

- b. North Bay Aqueduct: Deborah Barr (Water Agency) reported that she will attend the State Water Contractors Operations, Maintenance, and Engineering (OME) meeting the following week and expects to have additional information regarding North Bay Aqueduct operations and maintenance for the next SWAC meeting.
- c. Solano Project: Deborah Barr (Water Agency) reported that the Water Agency is working with the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation (USBR) and SID to arrange an inspection of the Solano Project penstocks, potentially in January 2027. Because of challenges identifying appropriately certified USBR personnel, alternative inspection methods such as remotely operated vehicles or drones may need to be considered. The Water Agency is also looking to add additional surveillance at the dam. Deborah reported that the Water Agency Board recently approved design efforts for replacement of radial gates 1 and 12 at Putah Diversion Dam. A design kickoff meeting is expected within the next one to two weeks. The Water Agency is also planning site improvements that may go to bid within the next several months and a panel replacement project scheduled to occur during canal cleaning in November.

In response to a question from Cary Keaten (SID), Deborah explained that the Water Agency determined gates 1 and 12 will initially be fully replaced. The Water Agency may rehabilitate one of the removed gates for use in future replacements, but will first evaluate the gates' condition after removal. Deborah also noted that, based on DWR discussions regarding similar replacement projects, full replacement may be more efficient than rehabilitation under certain field conditions. The first two gate replacements will therefore help the Water Agency evaluate the preferred approach for future work.

Cary asked whether the Regional Intertie feasibility work would address golden mussel concerns, particularly the potential for the intertie to contribute to the spread of mussels. Deborah explained that the feasibility study will identify the presence of golden mussels and recognize potential capacity and operational concerns, but the detailed response and control measures will be addressed through the separate vulnerability assessments. Chris Lee added that chemical trials began this week and that results should be available before the intertie studies are finalized, helping inform the project approach.

- d. Bay Delta Planning Issues: No additional updates were reported beyond prior discussion.
- e. Flood Management Issues: Deborah Barr (Water Agency) reported that the next flood group meeting is scheduled for October 22, 2026. A presentation by Charlotte Biggs with DWR is planned regarding Little Egbert and the status of the project. Misty Kaltreider (Solano County) confirmed that Charlotte had recently confirmed her participation and presentation.
- f. Other Regional and State Issues: No additional updates were reported beyond prior discussion.
- g. Other Issues: Deborah Barr (Water Agency) noted that the Water Agency is participating in development review to provide input to the cities and counties as development proposals move forward.

Justen Cole (Vacaville) asked for an update on the lawsuit concerning the North of Delta allocation. Chris Lee (Water Agency) reported that the Water Agency received feedback from DWR and has been meeting with outside counsel and other parties regarding the case. DWR's current proposal would provide additional water, although it is not as much as originally anticipated. The trial date is anticipated to be March 2027, and the parties are continuing to work through remaining details with the goal of reaching a resolution before trial.

Alex Rabidoux (Water Agency) explained that staff's understanding of the North of Delta allocation mechanism has evolved as they reviewed the underlying State Water Project amendment and historical agreements. He noted that the mechanism contains several complexities, including provisions related to Advanced Table A and that some provisions have not operated as originally understood. He will circulate the applicable amendment to member agencies for review. Alex also clarified that the North of Delta allocation applies to all Solano agencies, Napa, and Yuba City.

8. Groundwater Planning

SGMA Update: Alex Rabidoux (Water Agency) reported that the Groundwater Sustainability Agency (GSA) had not met since the previous SWAC meeting and there were no major updates. The current grant program continues. Alex also reported that the Water Agency is beginning the Proposition 218 process for the next funding cycle, working with consultants to begin the fee study and related work. The current direction is to keep the funding structure as close to the existing level as possible, although some increase may be necessary based on costs.

Kelly Huff (Dixon RCD) provided a positive update on a groundwater recharge pilot project near Pedrick Road and south of Putah Creek. The project uses an approximately two-acre former tailwater return area that was modified to direct water into an existing pond. Instrumentation is being used to monitor infiltration, and Kelly reported that the pond level dropped approximately six to seven feet over one to two days following irrigation, demonstrating significant infiltration. Alex noted that the project had produced more recharge from agricultural tailwater than originally anticipated and could provide a useful example of a relatively simple, multi-benefit recharge project. A potential agency tour may be arranged.

9. Solano County Report

Misty Kaltreider (Solano County) reported that the County is exploring potential projects related to golden mussels and had recently met with Drew Gantner (Water Agency). She noted possible funding available through the California Department of Fish and Wildlife for the five Delta counties. She reported that the County is brainstorming potential projects and programs that could be supported through those funds. Misty also reminded agencies of several upcoming environmental review comment deadlines, including the partially recirculated Draft Environmental Impact Report for the Suisun Logistics Center, with comments due September 8, and the Corby Battery Energy Storage System (BESS), with comments due September 14.

Misty reported that Charlotte Biggs from DWR is also planning a separate Little Egbert workshop, apart from the flood group meeting, to reconvene Solano County, Rio Vista, RD 2068, the Water Agency, and other interested participants. The workshop is expected to occur in the September-October timeframe.

Austin Miller (Solano County) added that the County is tracking the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' Environmental Impact Report related to the Yolo Bypass, which is currently open for comment. He also reported that the County is re-engaging in discussions regarding the Cache Slough Complex Habitat Conservation Plan and the possibility of transitioning to a conservation benefit agreement. A small steering committee meeting is planned to discuss the potential transition. Austin further noted that the County is working with DWR and other partners on the Yolo Bypass Cache Slough Partnership Agreement, a 10-year agreement that expires this year.

10. Other Topics

Justen Cole (Vacaville) noted that SWAC currently does not have a vice chair and suggested that Paul Fuchslin (SID) serve in that role. With no objections raised, Paul Fuchslin was selected as vice chair. Justen explained that he believed having representation from an irrigation district in addition to a city would provide a broader perspective as SWAC continues efforts to make the meetings more of a two-way conversation.

Paul Fuchslin (SID) reported that he had recently participated in an ACWA Agricultural Committee meeting. One topic discussed was development of a framework to address non-native species in the Delta. The framework is intended to organize existing studies, establish how future studies should proceed and what outcomes should be sought, consolidate available information, and explore funding mechanisms. Paul noted that the effort is intended to build a stronger record regarding Delta conditions and the impacts associated with water management.

11. Public Comments

No public comments were made.

The meeting was adjourned at 1:30 PM.

BACKGROUND:

Weather forecasters are currently predicting a strong to potentially historic El Niño in California. While there is significant uncertainty in what the actual impact will be to Northern California, tracking precipitation and stream levels in and around Solano County is of vital importance. The purpose of the agenda item is to share with the Board the Water Agency’s Flood Monitoring Network, which is a tool to help all our member agencies and the residents of Solano County.

In 2002 (Allendale) and late 2005 (New Year’s Eve Flood) extensive flooding occurred within the greater Vacaville region, resulting in over 1,000 homes, residents, and businesses flooded within the City of Vacaville and outlying regions. In early 2006 staff were directed by the Board to hire a new staff member and to develop a flood monitoring network. Over the last 20 years the Water Agency has been actively operating, maintaining, and improving the Flood Monitoring Network across Solano and eastern Napa County. To date, the Flood Monitoring Network consists of 9 rain gages, 13 stream gages, and 2 lake level gages with data collected at 15-minute intervals and reported in near real-time on the Water Agency’s Flood Monitoring website. The Flood Monitoring Network helps to support flood hot spots in Solano County that include Sweeney Creek (North Vacaville), Ulatis Creek Watershed (Vacaville-Dixon), Suisun Creek (Fairfield, Cordelia), Green Valley Creek (Fairfield-Cordelia), as well as Lake Curry (Vallejo), Mt Vaca (Vacaville), and other Solano Project facility locations.

BACKGROUND:

On August 19, 2026, the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) released a revised draft to the Water Quality Control Plan for the San Francisco Bay/Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta (Plan).

Written comments are due on September 18, 2026. The State Water Board will consider adoption of the final draft Plan and final Staff Report at an upcoming public meeting on October 28-29, 2026, where interested persons will have the opportunity to provide oral comments.

The State Water Board’s Plan has two alternatives. There is the Unimpaired Flows alternative, which would include each of the Sacramento River Watershed tributaries including Putah Creek. For Solano County, the staff report identified that the Unimpaired Flows also called the regulatory pathway would significantly reduce water supplies from the Solano Project, North Bay Aqueduct, Vallejo Permit Water, Reclamation District No. 2068, and North Delta Water Agency which would be detrimental to Solano County’s urban, industrial, and agricultural community.

The second alternative, supported by the Governor and the California Natural Resources Agency, is the Healthy Rivers and Landscape Program (i.e., Voluntary Agreements). Rather than just flow increases, the Healthy Rivers and Landscape Program proposes additional flows, restoration efforts, and scientific monitoring as a more holistic approach to help declining fish species in the Bay-Delta. Water Agency staff have been actively engaged with the
